**ONE KILLED, 5 HURT
IN AUTO ACCIDENTS**

Car Dives Forty Feet Into Path of Train—Policeman Saves Occupants

TAXI MAN IS HELD

One man was killed and five persons were injured in three automobile accidents here last night and early this morning in widely separated sections of the city.

Michael Kelly, thirty-five years old, of 2529 Tenth street, died in the Hahnemann Hospital after being run down at Broad street and Ridge avenue by a truck.

William Hunsicker, twenty-six years old, 2716 Broad street, a driver for the Yellow Cab Company, who operated this automobile, will be arraigned this morning in the Central Station. Thursday said he was driving north on Broad street, and as he started to cross Ridge avenue Kelly stepped from the curb directly in the path of his car. He received a fractured skull.

Two men had a narrow escape from death when a motortruck in which they were riding, smashed through an iron railing at Thirty-fourth street and Mantua avenue and plunged down a forty-foot embankment to the tracks of the Pennsylvania Railroad. The men were pinned in the wreckage of the truck. A policeman climbed down the embankment, freed them and flagged an approaching train.

The truck was driven by Joseph Gotwald, fifty-four years old, 3421 Euclid avenue. With him was C. R. Jones, 1212 North Thirtieth street. As the truck whizzed south on Mantua avenue an automobile owned and driven by Mrs. Belle Gregory, 1008 South Farragut terrace, was coming east on Thirty-fourth street. At the intersection Gotwald saw a collision threatened and he stepped on the accelerator.

The truck gained in speed, went upon the sidewalk and crashed through the iron railing at the top of the forty-foot embankment.
