Engagement Officially Announced After Family Council

Potsdam, Sept. 19.—By A. P.—After a family council of the House of Hohenzollern, held here, it was officially announced that former Emperor William is to marry the widowed Princess Hermine von Schlegel-Schaumburg, who was born Princess Reuss of the older line. The marriage probably will take place in November.

Princess Reuss is thirty-five years old and is the mother of five children, the eldest of whom is fourteen. The princess owns a large estate at Saxe-Coburg, Silesia.

Ever since reports of the latter's engagement to her have been circulated, monarchists have been opposing the match. Their principal objection is that the princess is not of royal birth. Before her marriage to Prince John of Schlegel-Schaumburg, who died in April, 1920, she carried the title of Hereditary Princess of Schaumburg-Lippe.

Princess Hermine is tall and handsome. She has a graceful carriage and displays a fine personal dignity. She is blond and her features have a certain quality of exquisite sweetness. It is reported that the Kaiser was first impressed by the princess following her return of exilience on the death of the Empress Augusta. It was then that he invited her to visit him. Subsequent visits followed and developed into the engagement.
