Judges Throw Out Plea to Cut \$25,000 Bonds Demanded by Monaghan

Judge Lewis Imposes First Drug Sentence

Constantinople, Sept. 22.—Turkish Nationalist forces have seized the town of Ez-ine, on the Asiatic side of the Dardanelles, and are threatening Kum Kalesi, an important key position to the southern side of the Straits. The Kemalists were nowhere opposed.

The Nationalist move, in the opinion of the naval experts here, will enable the Turks to prevent ingress to the Dardanelles to the British Atlantic Fleet units, which are on the way from Malta.

The important positions involved were up to today occupied by the French and the Italians and from them the heavy Turkish batteries can command the entrance to the Straits.

Within Neutral Zone

Ez-ine is a small town in the valley of the Menderes River in the high district south of the Dardanelles and is less than twenty miles from Kum Kalesi. The latter town, which the Nationalists are threatening, is on the waterway itself—almost at the entrance to the Straits from the Aegean.

Both shores are within the zone of neutrality about the Straits laid down by the Treaty of Sevres. It is uncertain from available data whether Ez-ine is within the military zone of neutrality, proclaimed in May, 1921.

These would appear to be no doubt, however, that King Khaled is within this latter zone against the invasion of which warning was issued in Constantinople yesterday by the British General Harrington, commander-in-chief of the allied forces.

Parley With Kemal Falls

General Poles, the French commander here, returned yesterday from his mission to Istanbul. It is understood that he has been unsuccessful in his attempt to persuade Mustafa Kemal Khaled of the necessity of leaving the Straits and occupying Harpoot. It is believed Kemal insisted on that observance of the neutrality of the Straits by the Nationalists should be postponed until some adequate guarantee from the Allies that there would be no invasion of Turkey.
