

UPROAR IN COURT; MRS. POULIN HISSED

Witness Says Her Husband Was at Church and Not With Mrs. Tiernan

SEVERELY CROSS-EXAMINED

South Bend, Ind., Sept. 22.—Mrs. Harry Poulin, first witness to be called by the defense in the hearing of the maternity case in which Mrs. Augusta Tiernan charged that Harry Poulin, and not her husband, is the father of her third child, took the stand yesterday afternoon and admitted almost in its entirety the testimony previously given by Mrs. Tiernan concerning the alleged relations between Poulin and Mrs. Tiernan.

Mrs. Poulin was summoned after the State had rested. The large gallery, whose demonstrations had annoyed the ire of Judge D'Amico on several occasions, showed Mrs. Poulin, who throughout maintained a composed air in her husband's presence, with hisses and cat-calls.

Mr. McNeil said his wife's foster mother appeared to be rational and that she had never made any threats. He said he believed that intense grief over her husband's death gradually appalled her reason.
