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VOICE MAY CIRCLE EARTH BY GIANT AUDION BULB

World's Greatest Valve Just Built in Chicago Will Deliver 100,000 Watts and Promises Even Greater Developments

DISPATCHES from Chicago announce that scientists in the laboratories of the Western Electric Company have succeeded in constructing the world's largest vacuum tube...

Science contains few stories quite so romantic as the history of the development of this bit of apparatus which has rightly been called "the modern Aladdin's lamp."

It has already accomplished marvels, and set two of the greatest records in electricity, in the early experiments, totally overlooked or misunderstood the very attributes which later grew to be its most valuable functions.

The non-scientific reader it may be well to explain right here that a vacuum tube is more or less like the ordinary electric light bulb which is used for house lighting...

Many years ago when Edison was experimenting with his early type of lamp, he built one in which he inserted a metal plate as well as the filament within the bulb...

He found that when the positive side of the battery was connected to the plate and the filament burned brightly, his measuring instrument showed an electric current...

AS EVERY one knows, a current of electricity of ordinary strength will not pass through space from one conductor to another...

EDISON was too busy with other matters to carry these experiments any further. He merely reported it to scientists and let it go at that.

It was not until 1901 that it seemed to have anything to do with this phenomenon, and it was merely referred to as "the Edison effect."

It was the land-line telephone which served to bring the Edison effect out of the laboratories and into commercial use.
