

FREIGHT EMBARGO DECLARED BY P. R. R.

Coal and Food Are Virtually Only Shipments Being Moved

ROAD IS NOW TAXED

Coal and food are virtually the only shipments being moved by the Pennsylvania Railroad today.

A drastic embargo announced by officials of the company yesterday halts all other forms of freight from coal and food from the mines of the coal fields and the movement of food to consumers in large cities. Heavy shipments of grain are also being held, and the peak of the movement has not yet been reached.

Food and fuel shipments have already used the facilities of the railroad to the extent equaled only in 1920. Almost 200,000 more cars have been moved this month than during the same period last year.

The embargo halts shipments of everything east and west originating on connecting lines, except the necessities of life and provisions. In addition, for an intra-system embargo for ten days beginning Monday. Much of the congestion due to the present heavy shipments of coal will have been relieved in the ten days, it is believed.

Coal and Grain Shipments Heavy

Coal and grain are being moved by the Pennsylvania system in record-breaking volume, and this, with other heavy shipments, has taxed the railroad to its capacity. Since September 1 the number of loaded freight cars handled has increased to more than 17,000 per week, as against 96,400 during the first week of January, 1922. In the first three weeks of September, 513,000 loaded cars were handled, while in the same period of last year the number was 385,000.

Railroad officials say the heavy movement is the natural result of the current, unusual demand for coal, the bumper crop now coming into the market and the increase in general business activity. The height of the freight movement has not yet been reached, they say, but may be expected soon.

A statement issued by the railroad explains the purpose of the embargo and the steps taken to make it effective.

PRINCE TO STUDY IN PARIS

Member of Japan's Imperial House Will Be Military Student

Tokio, Sept. 29.—Prince Asuka, of the imperial house, is going to Paris to spend a year studying military tactics under the French, who earlier moved the famous Japanese warriors, Yamagata and Oyama.

The earliest outside influence on the Japanese Army came from France, though later German influence predominated. Now a detachment of French aviators is engaged here in teaching the Japanese to fly. The practice of sending officers to Europe as students has long been established.

Prince Asuka is a son-in-law of the late Emperor Meiji and heads a recently established branch of the imperial family. He is a member of the United States after his year in Paris.

NEW CHANDLER INDICTMENT

Defunct Brokerage Firm Accused of Embezzling Stock

Earl Meneshall and Frederick T. Chandler, Jr., former members of the defunct brokerage firm of Chandler Brothers & Co. were again indicted by the Grand Jury yesterday. The two defendants are listed for trial on November 1 next, in Criminal Court.

One of the indictments returned yesterday charges them with embezzling as broker of a certificate for 100 shares of the stock of the Swift International Company, valued at \$2700, and another charges them with conspiracy in that connection.

Electric Concerns Ask Charters

Harrisburg, Sept. 29.—Applications for charters for more than a dozen new electric companies in Western Pennsylvania counties have been approved by the Public Service Commission, including a group for Allegheny County and one for Crawford and Venango. The Allegheny list includes one for Coraopolis. The commission cleared its dock of numerous delay applications, directing eleven in Berks County and six in Bucks to stop operating following complaints by taxicab or trolley companies. One was also ordered to stop in Philadelphia.

N. Y. CUSTOMS RULINGS

Imported Rubber Boots Held Dutiable at 30 Per Cent

New York, Sept. 29.—Rubber boots imported by the United States Rubber Company, Boston, were held dutiable at 30 per cent on wearing apparel composed of cotton and India rubber, under paragraph 256, Act of 1913, in a decision by the Board of United States General Appraisers yesterday. Claim was made for duty at 10 per cent, under paragraph 308, as manufacturers in chief value of India rubber.

Protest of the Canadian Pacific Railway was sustained in a ruling according free entry to sawed maple lumber imported from Canada, under paragraph 647, of the Act of 1913. The collectors' assessment at 10 per cent was reversed.

Steel hinges imported by Henry Kayser & Co. were held dutiable at 35 per cent, under paragraph 323, as spangles. The importers claimed classification as manufactures of metal at 10 per cent.

Glass lamps and trumpets imported by Strauss & Co. were held dutiable at 35 per cent at 35 per cent instead of colored glass at 45 per cent. Applied to the new tariff, this latter case presents an interesting situation. Toys pay 70 per cent under the new law, whereas articles of colored glass pay only 65 per cent. In the same ruling the collector's assessment at 45 per cent on novelty glasses containing red liquid concealed therein was affirmed.
