

FONTAINE LETTERS OFFERED IN COURT

Dancer's Endearing Notes Read in \$1,000,000 Suit Against Whitney

BREACH OF PROMISE CASE

Schenectady, N. Y., Oct. 5.—Letters alleged to have been sent by Evan Burroughs Fontaine to Stealing E. Adair, her former husband, were read yesterday before Supreme Court Justice Henry V. Borst by James A. Leary, of Saratoga Springs. He is counsel for the defendant in an action for \$1,000,000 brought by Evan against Cornelius Vanderbilt Whitney, son of Harry Payne Whitney, for alleged breach of promise.

The letters, photographs of Evan and Adair in bathing suits and in being posed, and affidavits from witnesses of Adair, together with affidavits from hotel men, were introduced by Attorney Leary. These were to substantiate his claim that Miss Fontaine secured her maintenance of marriage to Adair by fraud and perjury, and that her claim, when she obtained annulment, that she and Adair had not lived together after the wedding was not true.

Hearing yesterday was on order of Miss Fontaine to compel Whitney to accept service of the complaint. Justice Borst reserved decision.

Charles A. Leary, of New York City, appeared as counsel for Miss Fontaine. He said that his client was not a mature woman who was trying to lure a millionaire, but was of sound and unimpaired character. Attorney Leary pleaded by reading a letter alleged to have been written by her former husband, calling him "dearest sweetie."

The letter was of a most intimate nature. This letter was dated March 27, 1919. "Dear," appeared to be the pet name for her husband. It was signed by her husband's pet name for her. The letter in part said:

"Oh, those sweet, happy days when you would come home to me, your wife, and I would be so happy."

Other Letter Produced

Another letter, dated April 23, 1919, said:

"My dearest darling, do you remember we had our first kiss in your arms and whispering those sweet and wonderful things which I never tire of hearing in my ears? I am so glad that I long for that as I do for you. I want you to be all I know you can be. If you will love me and love me like I love you, I will be yours."

There were also introduced photographs showing Evan and Adair in bathing suits. Leary produced a framed photograph of February 25, 1920, which showed her sitting on a bench with Evan, in which she told Adair she would love him for the remainder of her life, and asking Adair to appear by attorneys, but not to oppose the action and not to get in an attorney.

Another letter, dated February 5, 1920, was shown. In this she admitted to Adair she had not come to divorce, but she could get the divorce annulled outside of New York by coming to a big, and she asked him not to oppose the proceeding. She said she would swear that they had never been together after the marriage.
