McNamara's Charges Raised to Jay Vee Rating—Play Harrisburg Tech Tomorrow

ED FARRELL IN HOSPITAL

Tom McNamara yesterday afternoon after he had picked over the talent of the scrub players and the field.

"These thirty men are to be known as the Junior varsity and open their season this Saturday, and they are a fighting band of footballers," believe me," added Tommy.

From now on it will be a misdeed to call this team the scrubs. This has been organized and a full schedule has been arranged.

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This hot weather is causing lots of room for doubt as to the outcome of the game tomorrow. The Southerners are used to hot weather scrimmages and seem to thrive on it.

However, there is a lot in getting used to a thing. They are used to it and teams this far north are not. There is the difference. For this reason there has been somewhat of a let-up on the Penn squad this week so that they will not be overtired for tomorrow's contest.

"I do not believe that the weather will make any difference in the playing of our team," said Coach Helmsman. However, the boys are not accustomed to high temperature in October and I would like to see a cooler day for the game.

Three Backs Out "All season we have had a wealth of backfield material, and there has been a question as to the combination to use in the game. Right now we have a different problem. During the last week we have lost several first-class backs, who will not be available for tomorrow.

Woodard and Craig are both out with injuries and Ed Farrell has been hospitalized with a fever. We will not have so many men this week, but they will be in far better condition than they were last week.

Farrell is the latest loss to the squad. He and Papworth have developed the same symptoms, and have been put in the hospital under observation. Both have high fevers and will not be released until they show signs of improvement. Farrell played at a halfback last Saturday and Papworth started at guard.

Three changes have been made in the line. Frank Dewhurst, who started at end last week, has been replaced by Fairchild, the big Westerner, who has shown up so well all week.

From this position he will call the signals and direct the team. Dern is a natural football player and a student of the game. He has the knack of calling the right plays and from his position at center can look over his field to advantage.

Frank Sutherland has the call over the other candidates to fill the vacancy of Papworth at guard. Sutherland played this position on the varsity last year and will be an able substitute. He was late in reporting this season and this is the only thing that has kept him out of the regular line-up so far. When

he gets a little more conditioning he will be one of the best of the Penn line.

The remainder of the line will be the same as started last week. Thurman and Kauffman will be in at tackle. Kelly at the other guard and Estravasz at the other end as running mate to Fairchild.

The backfield, with Captain Foss Miller and Sullivan at halves, Al Yocelin at quarterback and Tex Hamer at fullback, is also the same, except that Sullivan and Miller have shifted halves. Miller will play at right instead of left, his old position. Sullivan will play back and take care of the blocks. It is almost certain that Sullivan will also do the punting.
