

First Concert Given This Afternoon at Academy Under Stokowski

All indications point to the most successful season the organization has ever had, The hour of the Friday afternoon concerts has been changed, and this senson they begin at 2:30 instead of 3 o'clock, as heretefore. This is expected to be an improvement and make for the convenience of both the orches-tra and patrons. The hour of the Saturday evening concerts is unchanged.

There have been few changes in the ersonnel of the orchestra and, perhaps,

the most important of these are the substitution of Georges Grissez for Daniel Bonade as first plarinet, and that of Walter Guetter for Richard Krueger as first bassoon. Mr. Guetter is a Philadelphian, the sou of Julius Guetter. and he has been the first bassoon of the Chicago Orchestra for a number of Chamber Music Art Society, of New

New Stage Setting

One of the most interesting features of the opening concert was that it is the first time that the new stage setting and platform designed by Mr. Stokowski of the orchestra are projected into the auditorium have been so changed as to render the softer tones more clearly heard without any loss in color and to add brilliancy to the louder tones.

Mr. Stokowski is greatly pleased with the results of the new setting. The setting is considerably higher than the for-mer one and the platform upon which the mombers of the orchestra sit has been rebuilt in accordance with the plans of the whole stage. The orchestra has been moved further back, and there has been a consequent gain of about seventy-five seats in the pit.
