**GIRL'S ASSAILANTS HAD FOLLOWED HER**  
 Miss Marion Fleo Recognized  
 One of Men She Stabbed in  
 Tunnel on 17th Street

**MET THEM IN WOODS SUNDAY**  
 Miss Marion Fleo, twenty-year-old  
 telephone operator, this morning re-  
 peated her belief that the man she  
 stabbed yesterday afternoon when he  
 and a companion sought her by the  
 arms in the tunnel on Seventeenth  
 street near Market had been following  
 her for several days.  
 As she entered the tunnel on her  
 way home from work yesterday after-  
 noon, the man came up from behind  
 her and caught her arms. She hastily  
 seized a pocketknife from her purse  
 and stabbed one of the men in the chest.  
 He and his companion fled, with blood  
 streaming down his face.  
 "These same two men have followed  
 me home from work on several oc-  
 casions," Miss Fleo said this morn-  
 ing. The girl lives at 1616 Ellsworth  
 street.

**Saw Men in Woods**  
 "The last time I saw them," she  
 said, "was Sunday in Carpenter's  
 woods, Germantown. I had gone for a  
 trolley ride and then for a walk. Shortly  
 after I entered the woods, I heard a  
 noise behind me in the bushes, as  
 though some one were walking in a  
 stealthy manner. I saw two young  
 men, about twenty-four years old and  
 well dressed, and I recognized them as  
 the same persons who had followed me  
 when I left work. I was rather fright-  
 ened and ran back to the trolley line.  
 "When I saw them again yesterday  
 I was afraid. I walked fast to try  
 to get away from them, but they kept  
 up, and when I got into the tunnel they  
 hastened their pace and came up to  
 me. I held on to the hold of my arms.  
 The first thing I thought of was the  
 knife in my purse, so I got it out and  
 used it as well as I knew how."

**BILLION-DOLLAR POWER PROGRAM IN CALIFORNIA**  
 Bankers Told of Sierras Project  
 Costing More Than Panama Canal  
 Del Monte, Calif., Oct. 10.—(By A. P.)—California power companies have  
 developed a program calling for the ex-  
 penditure of more than one billion dol-  
 lars, or about three times the cost of  
 the Panama Canal, George R. Mar-  
 tin, Los Angeles banker, said today in  
 addressing the eleventh annual con-  
 vention of the Investment Bankers'  
 Association of America here.  
 Construction work being done by one  
 company in the high Sierras of South-  
 ern California with a force of 2000  
 men will cost \$15,000,000 more than  
 the Panama Canal, Mr. Martin said.  
 The question of how far a munici-  
 pality can safely go in the creation of  
 public debt never has received scientific  
 analysis, according to the annual re-  
 port of the municipal scientific com-  
 mission, submitted by its chairman,  
 L. E. Wakefield, Minneapolis.

"If the interests of municipal bond  
 investors are to be properly safe-  
 guarded," the report said, "there must  
 be a scientific study of this problem to  
 determine what legislative restrictions  
 should be made to apply in order to  
 protect municipalities against them-  
 selves, without making the restriction  
 so stringent as to hamper the reason-  
 able development of public facilities."

**AVIATORS MAKE READY FOR NATIONAL CONTEST**  
 Assemble in Michigan for Races  
 Scheduled Tomorrow  
 Mount Clemens, Mich., Oct. 10.—  
 (By A. P.)—Soifridge Field, near  
 here, probably was the busiest aviation  
 center in the country today. With  
 150 or more airplanes of all types al-  
 ready here for the national air races  
 that begin tomorrow, and with others  
 arriving throughout the day, the re-  
 ception resembled a huge reception  
 park for army, navy and commercial  
 pilots coming to take part in the three  
 days' program, or to witness the con-  
 tests.

"The 'son to Detroit' contest was ex-  
 pected to bring a score of machines  
 today and early tomorrow. The first  
 arrivals in this race, the winner of  
 which is to be determined on points  
 for long flight, time consumed and load  
 carried, came in late yesterday. They  
 were Charles S. Jones and "Jay"  
 Benson, who flew from Buffalo. Final  
 tests of the racers were under way  
 today, all of the navy's entries in  
 the Pulitzer race being put through  
 their final workouts.  
 The navy's "mystery ship," which  
 has been under guard day and night  
 since it arrived in Soifridge, was ac-  
 cused yesterday and today for the  
 first time this morning by Lieutenant  
 L. H. Sanderson, of the marine corps,  
 who will pilot it in the Pulitzer race.

**SUN YAT-SEN MEN START TO REGAIN CHINESE POWER**  
 Invaders Are Near Foochow, Being  
 Led by General Hsu  
 Amoy, China, Oct. 10.—(By A. P.)—  
 The civil war is growing more of a tense  
 military situation in this province. In-  
 vading forces, seeking to supplant the  
 provincial government, are nearing Foo-  
 chow, the capital.  
 General Hsu Tsung-Chi, who formerly  
 commanded an army under Sun  
 Yat-Sen, the deposed president of the  
 South China Republic, is leading one of  
 the invading armies, and he is being  
 attacked on the ground that it is in-  
 tended to eliminate Li Hou-Chi, the military  
 governor, whom Hsu terms a public  
 enemy.  
 Chinese think the expedition against  
 Foochow is a political move made by  
 the Sun Yat-Sen faction to establish  
 a foothold and a base for future opera-  
 tions.

**WHISKY AS MEDICINE**  
 Delaware Physicians Want It Free  
 From Legal Dictum  
 Dover, Del., Oct. 10.—Use of whisky  
 for medicinal purposes borders within  
 the scientific province and should not  
 be determined by legal or arbitrary dic-  
 tum, in the opinion of the Medical So-  
 ciety of Delaware in convention here.  
 The society last night approved a  
 resolution calling upon Secretary of  
 Treasury Mellon to recommend that  
 provisions be made for the supply of bonded  
 whisky for medical use only, and that  
 a fixed retail price for the liquor be  
 established by the Government.  
 The resolution was previously  
 adopted by the national convention of  
 the society in St. Louis, after a refer-  
 endum showed that more than 51 per  
 cent of the physicians in the United  
 States favored the continuance of the  
 "dosage method of treatment."

 loss is estimated at 2,000,000 yen.

**SEEKS UNIVERSITY HEAD**  
 California Institution Wants Suc-  
 cessor to Dr. Barrows  
 Berkeley, Calif., Oct. 10.—(By A. P.)—  
 Benjamin Ide Wheeler, president  
 emeritus of the University of California,  
 was back here today after an extensive  
 tour of the East, where, it was under-  
 stood, he sought a successor to Presi-  
 dent David P. Barrows, who resigned  
 last spring.  
 Mr. Wheeler refused to comment on  
 the result of his trip. From an authori-  
 tative source, however, it was learned  
 that President Emeritus Arthur Twining  
 Hadley, of Yale, was one of the men  
 under consideration.
