### PHILA. WOMAN PREDICTS MASSACRE IN PALESTINE

Mrs. Mary Greenwalt Says Turks Will Wipe Out Jews Unless They Emigrate

Asserts Moslem Star Is in the Ascendant—Foresees Union With Russia

"The Moslems are going to keep the Levant and the French and English may as well reconcile themselves to it. The star of the Orientals is ascending."

"This is the opinion brought back from a long holiday trip through the Near East by Mrs. Mary Hallock Greenwalt, pianist of notes and one time soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra."

Mrs. Greenwalt was born in Brantford near Beirut in Syria, where her father was a merchant.

During her time in the East, Mrs. Greenwalt has visited Turkey, Egypt, parts of the Sudan and Palestine.

"Possibly," she said, "Russia may be included in this new league. It seems to me that there the Oriental influence has pretty well triumphed over the Occidental."

Mrs. Greenwalt does not conceal certain pro-Turkish sympathies. She says earnestly that the Turks, particularly in the present movement, have been misrepresented by the Western world.

"Harsh words for British," she continued, "nothing has been said of the relentless persecution of nationalists under British and French domination; nor of the agitation resulting in massacres that have been deliberately fomented at Westminster and Paris."

"It has been the policy of French and British alike to maintain their dominion in the East by playing the Ottomans against one another."

"The underlying cause of the pan-Moslem movement," Mrs. Greenwalt declared, "has been economic persecution."

"The same situation is true in Palestine. There the Government exacts 40 per cent of the earnings of the land and there, I might say, too, foreign Jews are as high as anywhere in the East."

"Sooner or later the Jews must give up Palestine. The great Moslem population of the country is determined not to submit to Anglo-Jewish government. They will not consent to Hebrew as the official language of a country they consider their own."

"The Jews would go peacefully, but they would not be allowed to return."
