

MAIL BY AIRPLANE SERVICE INCREASES

International Aerial Meet at Detroit Told of Present Relay Flights

DELIVERING TO CHICAGO

Detroit, Oct. 11.—More than 12,000 pounds of first-class mail is delivered from three to four hours earlier each day than would be the case if the Postoffice Department had no air mail service. Assistant Postmaster General Henderson declared today in an address at the international aerial meet here.

The point of view of the department, he said, "is that the people are entitled to and should be given full advantage of additional speed in the matter of handling mail matter."

Mr. Henderson explained that the air mail service at the present consists of a relay advance of mail.

OBJECT TO FILM REALISM AT COST OF ACTORS' LIVES

Equity Association Protests Against Dangerous Movie Risks

New York, Oct. 11.—(By A. P.)—Realism in the movies at the cost of endangering the life and limb of the players has been denounced in a memorial submitted by Frank J. Gilmore to Will H. Hayes and Jesse L. Lasky. It was announced by the executive secretary of the Actors' Equity Association, last night.

The memorial finds "there are some directors who still insist on the actor 'taking chances,' and continues: "Such scenes, which result in injury or physical disfigurement to the player are often demanded. 'Realistic' fight scenes, automobile, train and ship scenes are often staged with utter disregard for the players' welfare. The wars of our industry demand 'doubles' for this work, but the supporting player is expected not only to be a good actor, but to do anything he is told to do or lose any further chance of employment."

"Very often surprises are sprung by the director unknown to the actor, as, for instance, a stage set changed nearly without the actor's knowledge, even though at the time he may be mounted on an unreliable horse."

The school boy cultivates the acquaintance of the boy who can play football, or has plenty of spending money, or has a well-known relative, hoping he will get a little reflected glory out of it.

Almost every important man is surrounded by a flock of little people who are contented to carry his messages and do his errands, simply for the pleasure of telling their friends that they are intimate with him.

It is all an evidence of vanity—the longing of the person who is of no importance to be thought important.

VANITY of this sort is very expensive. It is perhaps pardonable in the man of small ability, for he has no means of getting into the limelight save by standing as close as possible to some one who is looking in it.

But it is not the little man alone who thus seeks to gain reputation that belongs to others.

Men who could, if they were willing to work for it, become of real importance to their own accounts, seek to gain fame by attaching themselves to others.

They spend hours that they might be devoting to developing their own minds in seeking social position or notoriety by any device they can think of.

And when they gain it they are only known as satellites, while people to whom they boast of their achievements regard them merely as pitiful little sycophants.

THERE is only one road to solid reputation, which all people are justified in desiring. That road is the road that leads to all achievements. It means hard work and self-sacrifice and study and honest ambition.

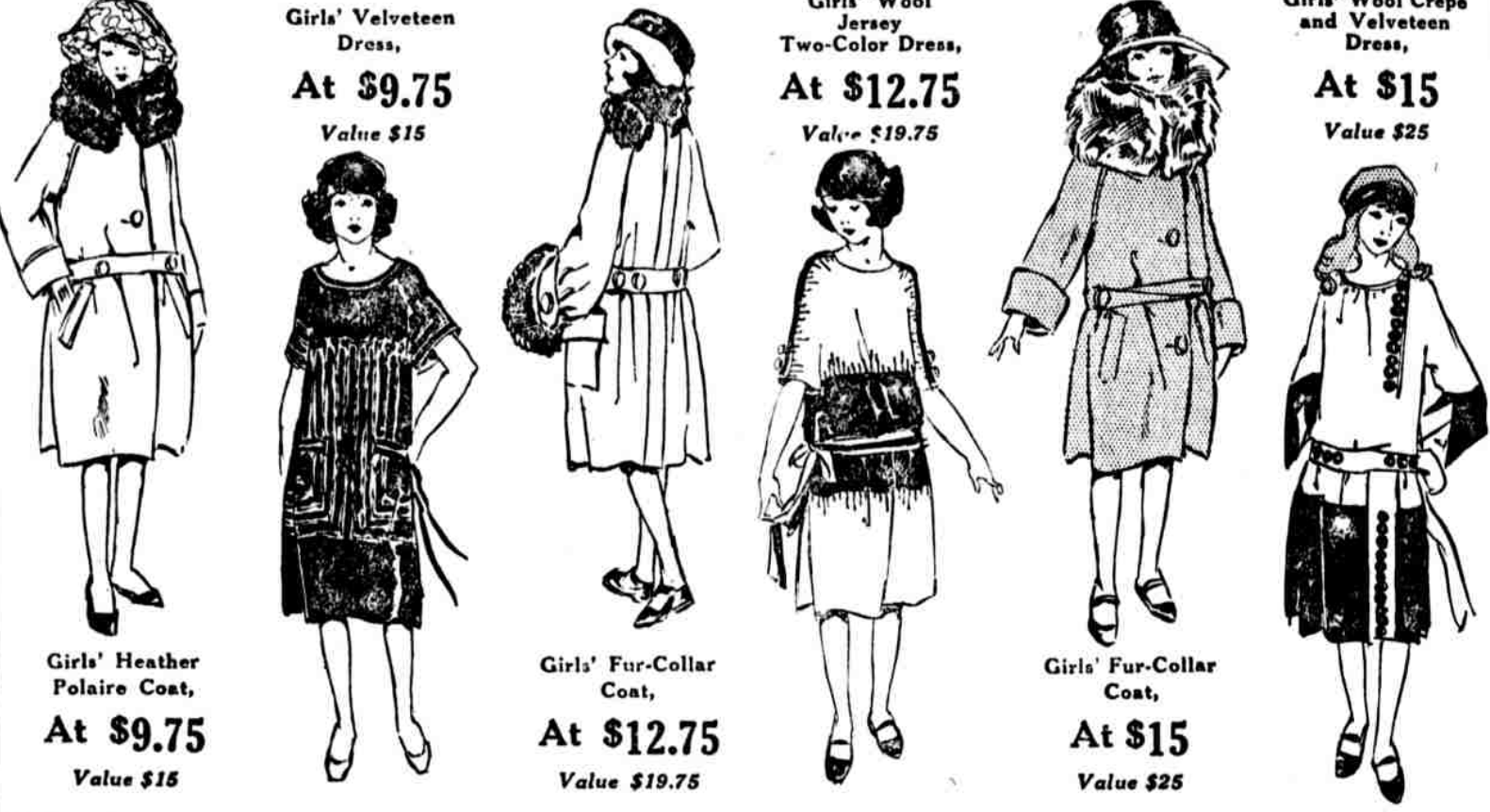
