

Scholastic Athletes Hold the Sport Limeglare Today With Score of Grid Contests

SCHOOLBOYS READY FOR BIG CLASHES

More Than Score of Gridiron Games Are on Tap for Today

"INTERAC" LEAGUE OPENS

More than a score of scholastic football struggles are down on the card for this afternoon. The major part of these games is the Inter-Academic League opening, which brings together St. Luke's School and Haverford School at the latter's field on Lancaster Pike, features the program.

Next in importance, from a local standpoint, is the Irish Athlon-Franklin High School clash at Brown Field, Bryn Athyn hold the Central High grididers to a deadlock last Friday.

The Pioneers, Public High School League champions, are a much more feared team since Charles Weeks, its captain, has returned to the fold. He will be back to play his halfback role.

Clymer, who has been taken out of the line, and Rooney and Schumacher round out one of the strongest back-fields in the scholastic ranks.

Coach Geiger's eleven is favored to win, but the Newtown aggregation has surprised in the past and it is not too probable that they will pull one over today. The game itself will be faced by the Miners, who will be seen in action against Franklin High.

The Penn Charter-Lansdowne team at Queen Lane should furnish some good football. The Little Quakers are off their attack of over-confidence which came upon them in the Radnor game, and are out to make things hot for Coach Weisz's eleven.

Lansdowne Handicapped

The latter team is handicapped by the loss of its captain, who broke his collarbone in a practice game. He will be out of the game for the rest of the season.

Roxboro High, which not only held Penn Charter to a scoreless deadlock last week, but also outplayed the Inter-Academic champions, will take a trip to Elkins Park and meet the Cheltenham High team. Roxboro is very strong this season and should cut a big figure in the inter-games.

As Cheltenham was humbled easily by Lower Merion last week, Roxboro should have a soft afternoon.

Minus the services of two regulars, Catholic High, undefeated in the two games played to date, will stuck up against the Miners, who are at Elkins Park.

Captain Joe Boand and Leonard are the two players out of the Purple and Gold line-up. The former was injured in the West Philadelphia High game, while the latter has been displaced by McKinney in the backfield.

Cochran Stanley Coddell has had the Captain's baton for the last three weeks. Coddell has devoted much of his attention to the senior game and the forward pass will most likely be used to great effect against the home team.

Cochran Wray has made several changes in his line-up for this contest. The former Penn star was not at all pleased with the way he worked against Roxboro High last Friday and ended in a 35-0 defeat for Abington.

The other two Inter-academic League entries, Germantown Academy and Episcopal Academy, will also see action. The former plays Chestnut Hill at the latter place, while the latter tackles the Friends' Central team.

West Catholic vs. Swarthmore

West Catholic High faces a difficult opponent when it goes up against Swarthmore High. The Garnet is a much improved team over the one which made a poor showing last year, and Coach Daugherty's protege from across the Schuylkill will have their hands full.

Centesville High, with two victories, will furnish the attraction for Germantown High at Centerville. Northgate High and Media High have fallen before the onslaughts of the up-state team.

The Clydes are crippled for a few days. Captain Gordon hurt his foot in the Camden game, and will not play. This makes a big gap at right tackle in the Germantown line and Coach Miller hasn't a good substitute to put in his place.

Chester High, which held Lansdowne to a scoreless tie last week, should have little trouble taking the measure of Darby High, which has already lost two games. This game will be held on the Chester field.

La Salle Prep, smarting from its defeat to the hands of Swarthmore Prep, is out to win it all vengeance on the Woodbury High team.

Brown Prep, out for its third straight victory, will hook up with Coach Carnegie's Moretown High eleven at the latter's gridiron, while another important Jersey school game will be held on the Collingswood field.

Jimmy Higgins, left halfback of the prep team, who starred in the Gloucester High game, witnessed his pickup in practice yesterday and will not appear in the game. This is a severe blow to Brown's prospects.

Wenonah-Millbury Academy, which generally has a fast eleven, opens its season with Gloucester at home. Practice games have shown the endots to be strong.

First the varsity and substitutes got together for a driving dummy scrummage,

and then the varsity was sent against the Crimson in a defensive affair in which Fisher's auxiliaries did the bulk of the work.

In the absence of Clark and Korman, Bradford, a first substitute last fall, was in the middle of the line, where he probably will play on Saturday against Bowdoin.

To fill their places, however, if they cannot play, Swaney, halfback, and Polham, fullback, who are two capable men, notwithstanding their comparative inexperience.

LEHIGH — Pointing more exclusively to the Rutgers game on Saturday afternoon, Coach Baldwin directed his varsity in a defensive scrummage against the yearlings yesterday.

He and his coaches realize quite seriously and seriously that the Senior, with last season's team unctuously intact, should be a much improved eleven over the one faced at New Brunswick last year.

PENN STATE — With two backfield leaders still unavailable, Penn State's players are doing everything in their power to develop players as running mates for Harry Wilson and Mike Palm, both of whom are stars of the first magnitude. MICHIGEN — The football squad had its final scrummage yesterday in preparation for the Lafayette game. The team looks good to the coaches and the fans despite several cripples, who are among the best of the players. The most encouraging feature, however, is the spirit of the men, who are determined to make better showing than last year against the great Epsom eleven.

Coach Ritter gave special attention to instructing the linemen in tactics to hold the Lafayette giants. Fulcher, the star drop-kicker, is improving, but there is still doubt about his ability to enter the contest.
