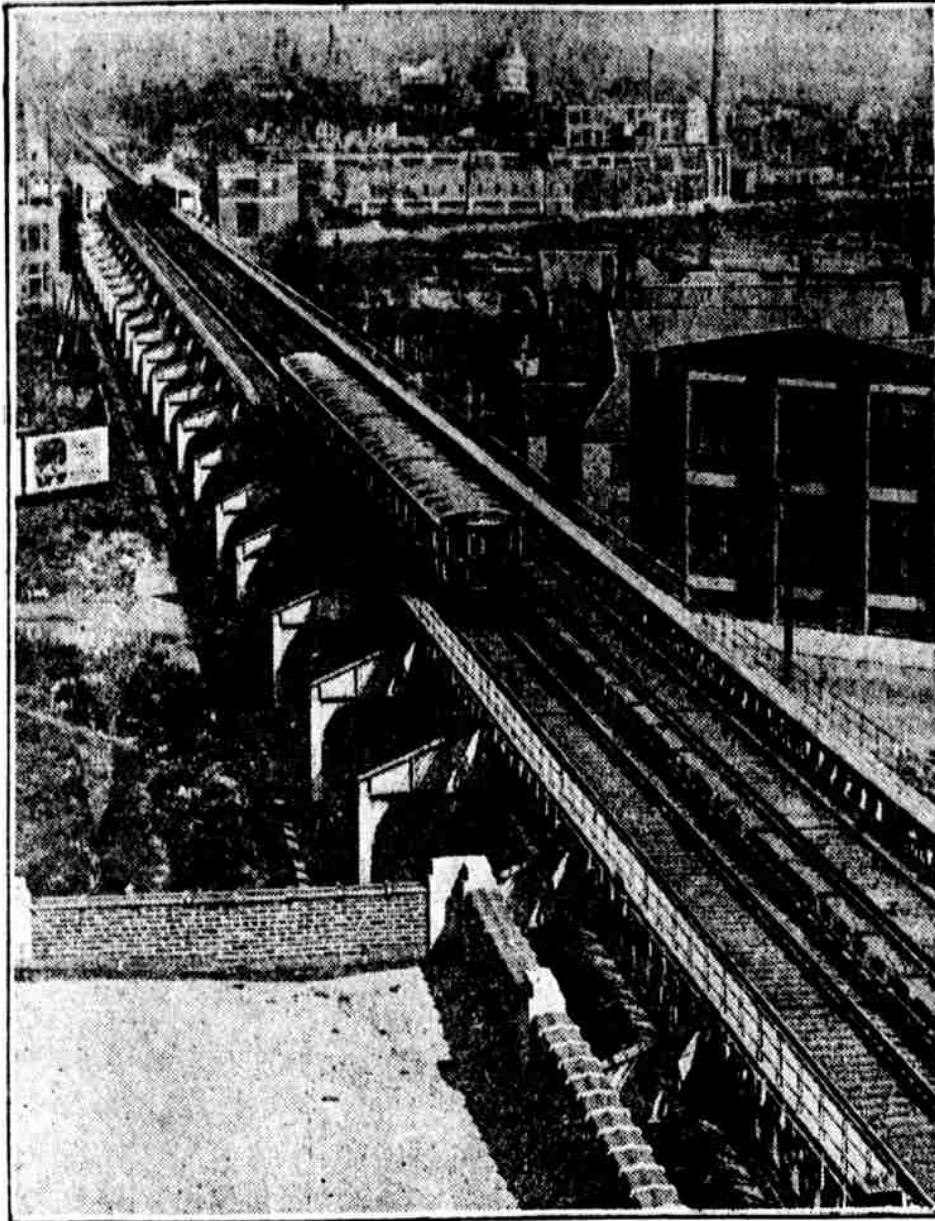




A ROYAL AUTOGRAPH. The Prince of Wales is placing his signature on a football during a British Legion sports meet.

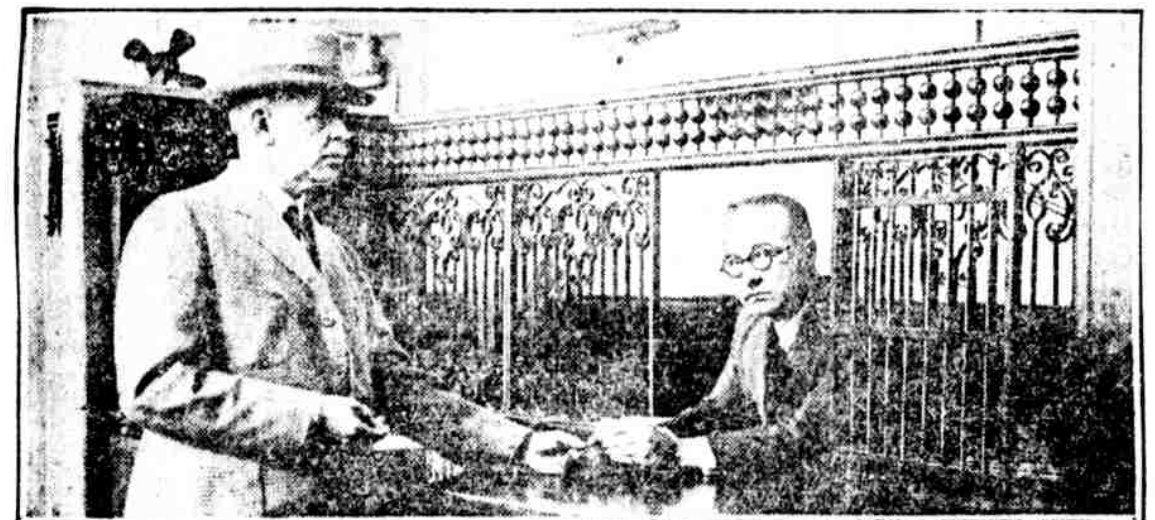

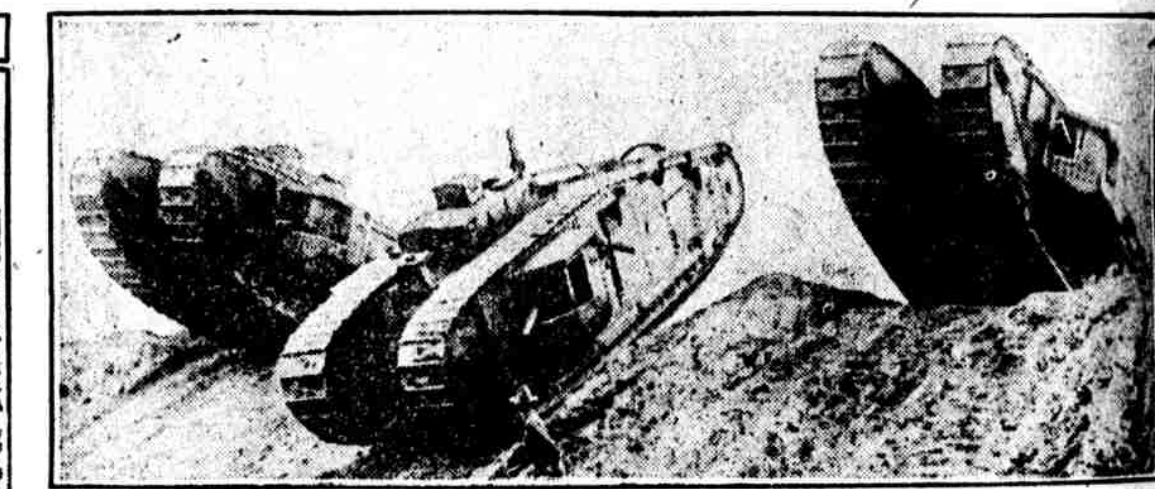

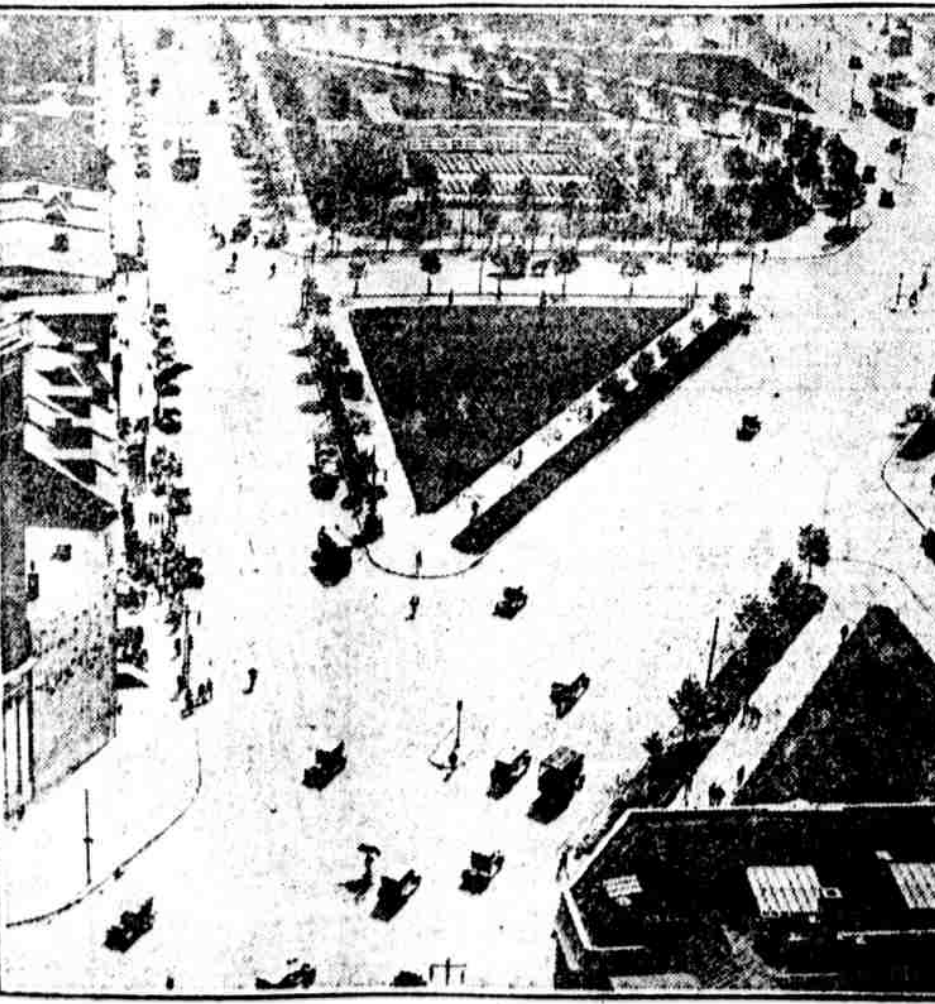
