



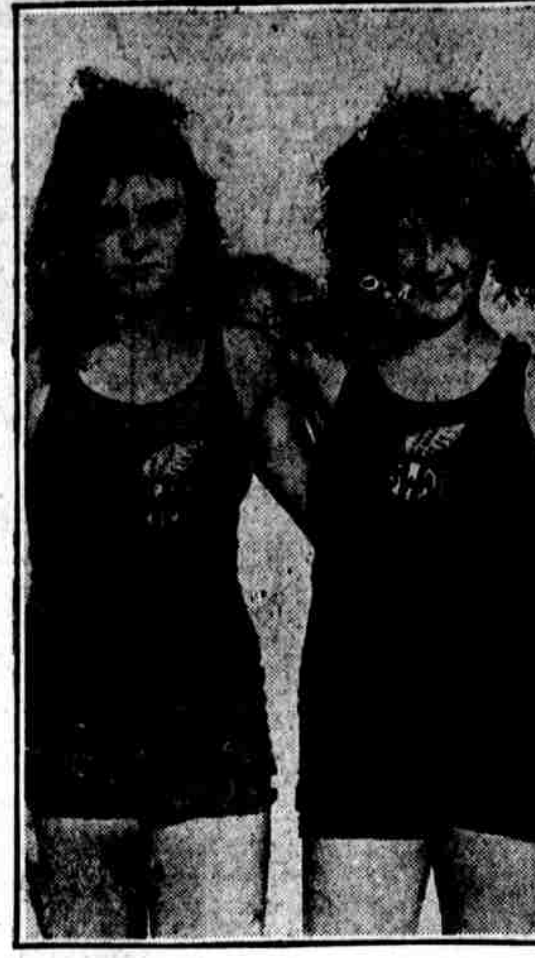

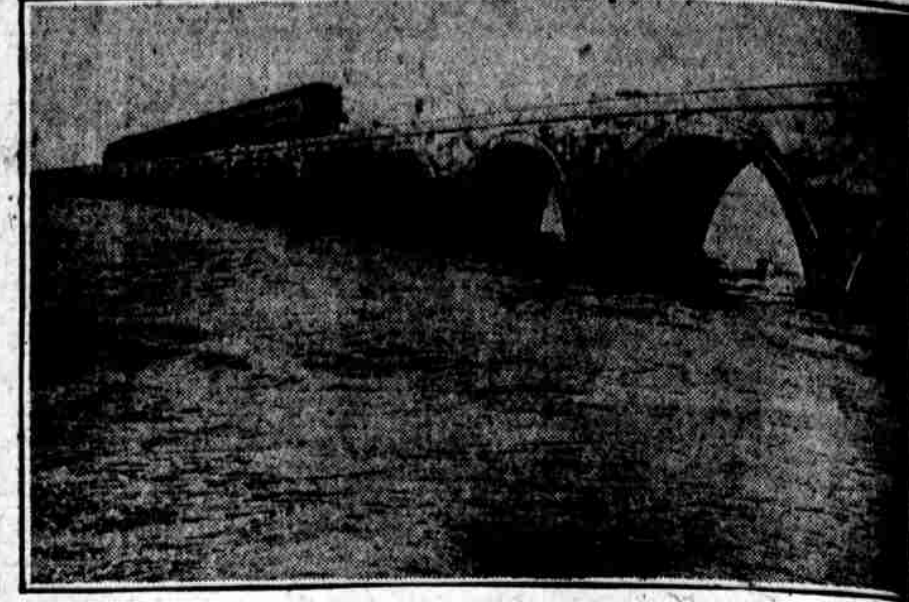

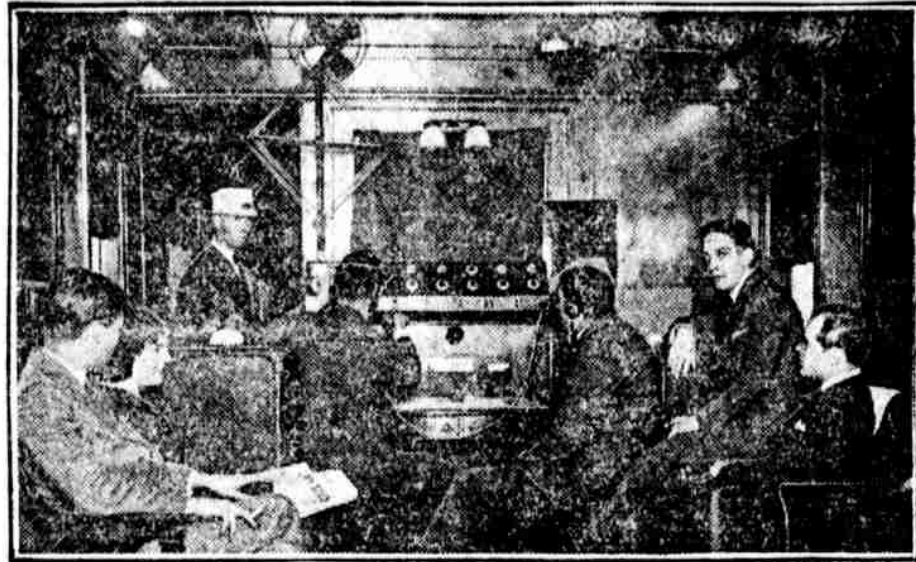

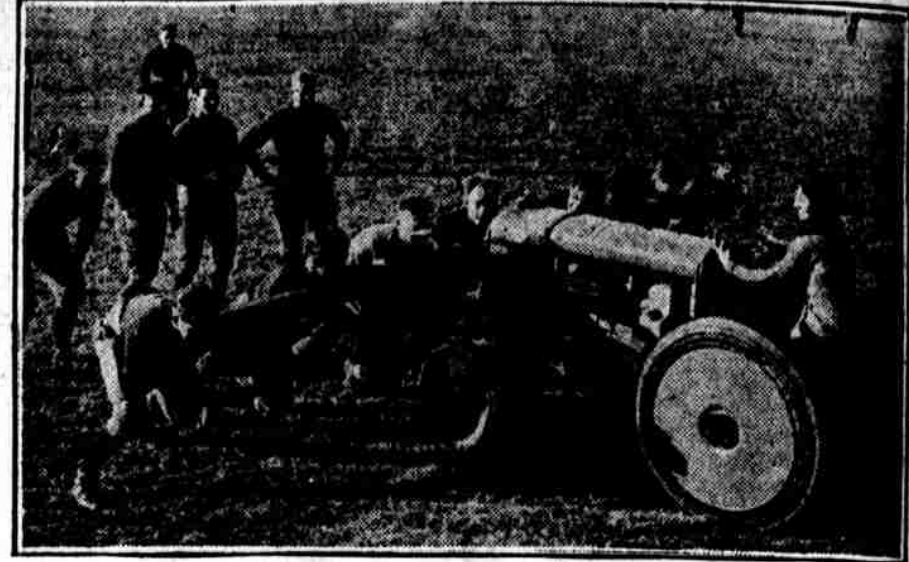

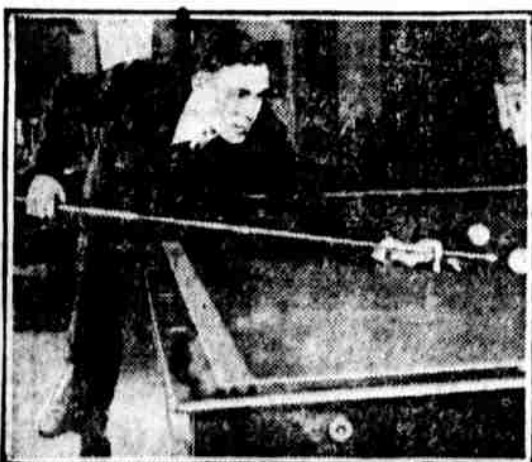

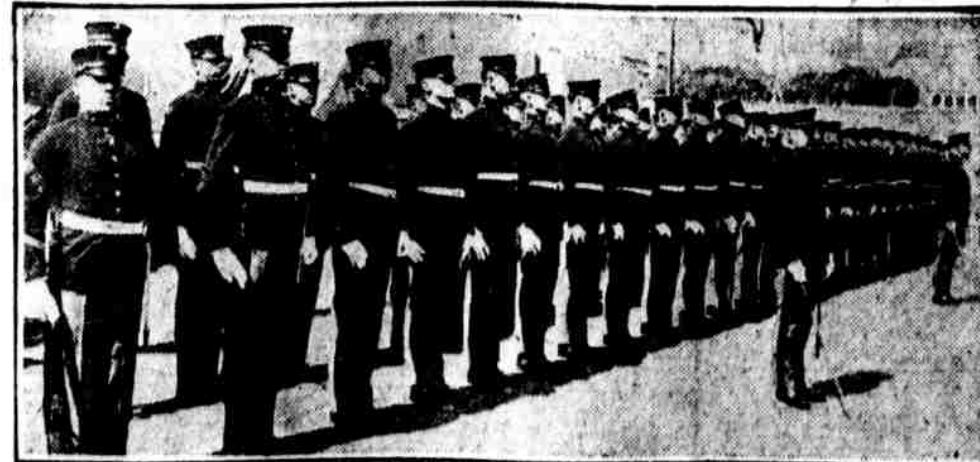

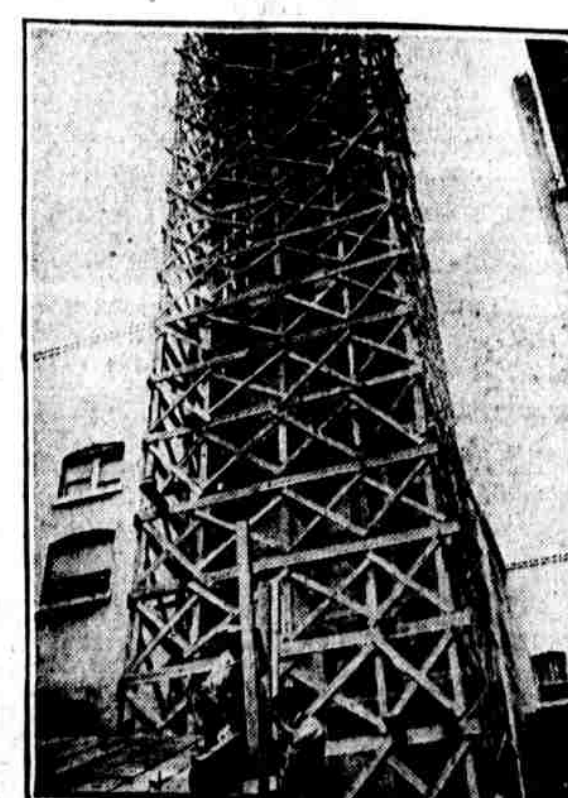
ERIC HAGENBACHER, professional billiard champion of Germany, has sent in his entry for the International Championship Tournament to be held in New York.
