

SENATOR FELTON ACCUSES KU KLUX

50,000 K's Controlled and Conducted Democratic Primary, She Asserts

'GEORGIA POLITICS ROTTEN'

Atlanta, Oct. 19.—Mrs. William H. Felton, junior United States Senator from Georgia until November 7, yesterday charged that the Ku Klux Klan, through its 50,000 Kluxers throughout Georgia, controlled and conducted the Democratic primaries Tuesday, in which Governor Thomas W. Hardwick and two other candidates were overwhelmingly defeated for the late Tom Watson's Senate seat by Walter F. George, of Vienna, Ga.

Mrs. Felton said "Georgia politics will continue to be rotten until the good people wake up and vote in our elections." She pointed out that in this State of 3,000,000 population a scant 80,000 votes were cast. "I am informed from reliable sources," she said, "that approximately 30,000 Ku Kluxers are registered. Everybody knows how rabid they have been against Hardwick since he took a stand against their control of the masks and in favor of law and order."

Governor Hardwick, following his defeat, made the announcement that he will serve the eight months remaining of his term as Governor and then begin publication of a weekly magazine of public opinion to be known as the "Clash of the Hammer." He also will propose a law in Atlanta. Senator Felton will be a weekly contributor to his magazine, he announced.

H. J. Harris, senior Senator from Georgia, who took an active hand in the fight was denounced by Hardwick yesterday as a "coward and a weakling."

Washington, Oct. 19.—A combination of the Ku Klux Klan and the labor element in Georgia is credited here with the overwhelming defeat of Governor Hardwick for the Georgia senatorial nomination. The friends of the late Senator Thomas W. Watson generally rallied to the support of Walter F. George, who won a decisive victory.

MILWAUKEE MAYOR RIDICULES THE KLAN

Milwaukee, Oct. 19.—Milwaukee will become the "hot spot" this side of hell for the Ku Klux Klan if any of the Klan police upon one of our citizens, whether he be black or white, red or yellow, Jew or Gentile, Catholic or Protestant," Mayor Daniel Hoan wrote in a letter he sent yesterday to C. Lewis Fowler, a member of the faculty of Luther University, of Atlanta.

The Mayor was replying to a letter protesting that the organization had been misrepresented and offering to aid the Mayor in his maintenance of law and order in Milwaukee. "Let me state," says the Mayor's letter, "that for law and order Milwaukee stands first among all the cities in the world. Consequently, for you to come here from the State where lynching is the most popular outdoor sport to tell our people that they need the organization with its masks and nighties, to insure law and order is itself ridiculous."

"We encourage all, including yourself, to bring to our officials in the ordinary way any evidence of law-breaking. We are ready to deal with it. Any claim, therefore, that hooded knights of the 'invisible empire' directed from your imperial palace, are needed here to enforce law and order is a sheer fraud. Your claim of setting up an 'invisible empire,' taking orders from your imperial palace in Atlanta, is either true or false. If it is false, you are collecting money from dupes by fraud. If it is true, you are attempting to transfer the Government from its proper officers to the Ku Klux Klan. Such a course will be met by the Federal government and members in the Federal penitentiaries, as was the case in the recent attempt of the Communists to organize an underground government."
