MISSING HUSBANDS KEEP POLICE BUSY

Bureau Here Got Trace of 2940 Persons During the Last Year

WHY GIRLS LEAVE HOME

Of the 3450 persons reported missing in Philadelphia last year the majority were husbands who deserted their wives, according to Edward M. Hinnegan, in charge of the Bureau of Missing Persons. Next comes wives who deserted their husbands.

Lured by Bright Lights "One girl, after a taste of the high life and bright lights, ran away from home and was listed as missing four times in two months. Such cases generally end up in a reformatory. These girls usually say that their parents are too strict.

"When boys run away, it is different. It is merely for adventure, in most instances. It seems to be the style for boys of a certain age to consider themselves misunderstood, and badly treated at home, or else they get their backs up at some parental ruling and off they go.

These long-lost relatives are the easiest to find. They are not in hiding, thinking that the world has long since lost all trace or recollection of them and that they are consequently safe.
