by the Congress of Chile, but it is expected that it will be.

If the new conference called by Mr. Hughes is successful as this one, the armaments of these little Central American powers will be limited and tribunals will be set for inquiring into the causes of disputes that arise rather frequently among them.

In Mr. Hughes invitation the Central American powers are invited to be an "example to the world and above all to the powers of this hemisphere."

Mr. Hughes said that the hope is realized that the way to a more complete association of nations in this hemisphere will be completely cleared when the Pan-American Conference meets next March.

Harding for Separate Associations
Many months ago Mr. Harding made known that his idea of international organization was separate leagues or associations in different parts of the world.

Mr. Harding said that this was the most important one ever made. With the ground cleared by the League of Nations, the Pan-American Conference and the Central American Conference for the more effective organization of the nations of this hemisphere, the attempt will be made to develop a real League of Nations of North and South America.

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Bonar Law and Lloyd George Ready

today with William T. Cosgrave, head of the Irish provisional government, with regard to Irish affairs.

Mr. Cosgrave was accompanied by Mr. O'Higgins, Secretary of Home Affairs, and Hugh Kennedy, law officer.

In parts of Great Britain, notably the Lancashire manufacturing towns and Glasgow, there are large resident Irish communities. How they will cast their votes in arousing interest both here and in Ireland, The Freeman's Journal, Dublin newspaper, crystallizes its advice to them in the sentence: "Whenever you see a Die-Hard head, hit it."

The Conservative Party campaign will be one against Socialism, judging from the flood of propaganda being released from the Unionist central headquarters.

"Safety first, vote Conservative." will be the slogan. Among the watchwords are: "Be Safe Under the Unionist, Not Sorry Under Socialism," and "No Hands Up to the Reds; Socialism is the Red Route to Ruin."

Reginald McKenna, former Chancellor of the Exchequer, long known as a staunch Liberal, created something of a sensation in this afternoon when he came out in support of Mr. Bonar Law's policy. "The policy of the new government is to be one to meet the economic conditions in which we now find ourselves," he declared in a speech. "It is the only policy which will give us any hope to restore our economic life."

At another point in his speech he said: "The name of Stanley Baldwin as Chancellor of the Exchequer will be welcomed in the city."

The question of Viscountess Astor's position in the cabinet, which the Conservative Association declared her the official Conservative candidate, but it is understood that Dr. Baile will oppose her, as well as a Labor candidate.

It is persistently rumored that Marquis Curzon of Kedleston, who was Foreign Minister in Mr. Lloyd George's cabinet, is to be made a Duke. This would be a most remarkable incident, as the dukedom is the highest rank in the British peerage, next only to the royal Princes, and is an honor rarely conferred. The last Duke created was Westminster, in 1874.

The Marquis, who was born George Nathaniel Curzon, was made a baron in 1903, became an Earl in 1911 and received his present rank last year. He is sixty-three years old.

Gossip also says that the immensely wealthy Sir Philip Sassoon is to be raised to the peerage.

He is the son of the great Anglo-Indian merchant, Sir Edward Sassoon, and was one of Mr. Lloyd George's secretaries. Two of Mr. Lloyd George's conferences with the French Premier

will be held at Sir Philip's sumptuous house near Hyde.

His sister is the Countess of Rockingham, two portraits of whom, one by Sargent, created a sensation in the last exhibition at the Royal Academy.

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PRESS OF LONDON FRIENDLY TO LAW

London, Oct. 24.—(By A. P.)—The Times comments in a friendly tone on Bonar Law's accession to the post of Prime Minister, expressing the belief that the country will be pleased at his absence from melodramatic promises and will confidently await the full exposition of his program.

The Daily Telegraph, which has been generally a hearty supporter of Lloyd George also is in favor of the new Prime Minister, commending the "modesty, moderation and strong common sense" of his address yesterday.

The Daily Mail, which is politically independent and one of Lloyd George's strongest antagonists, is likewise and tells Bonar Law that "his pleasant generalities" leave the country in the dark, and that he must give the electors "something more than a warmed-up dish of coalition stew."

The Daily Express reproduces a rumor that the Prime Minister may include the Earl of Balfour in his administration. Such a step, says the Express, would be disastrous, because Balfour is the favorite of the Zionist policy, whereby the Zionists' majority is to govern and dispossess the Arab majority with the aid of British bayonets.

It calls upon the Government to reverse its policy in Palestine and clear out of the Near East altogether.

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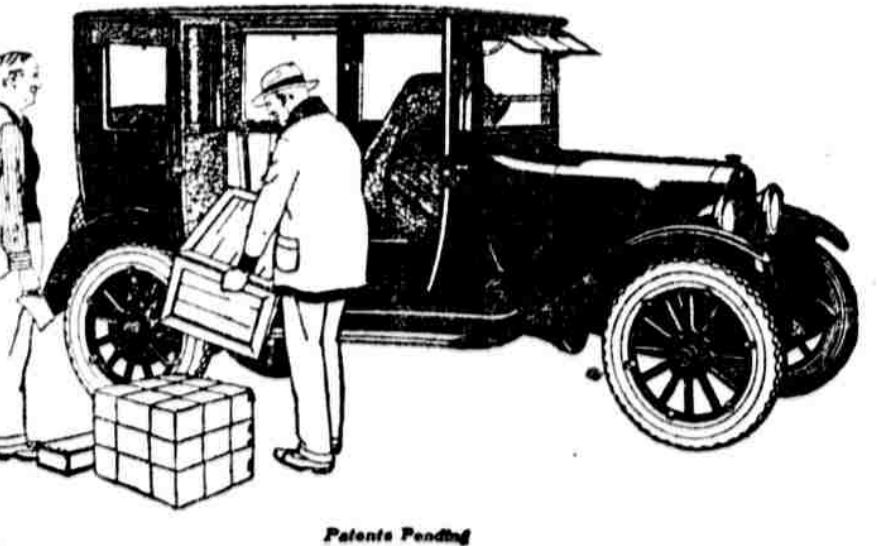
