

Pinchot Is Shattering All Campaign Precedents

Makes Crazed Misstatements
When Governor Sprout entered upon his administration he selected as his Secretary of Agriculture a practical farmer and dairyman, Prof. F. Fredrick Rasmussen.

I desire to do Mr. McSparran the justice to say that he is sincere in his belief that his election as Governor would benefit the Commonwealth.

Also that he would try honestly to give the people an efficient administration according to his ideas and conceptions of government.

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He will have a majority of a Legislature committed to his plan.

McSparran would not only have no Legislature to endorse his fantastic schemes, but he would be helpless without it.

\$20,000 FIRE IN HIGHTSTOWN

Plant of Grover Brothers Almost Wiped Out by Incendiary Blaze
Hightstown, N. J., Oct. 24.—Virtually the entire plant of Grover Brothers & Co. was wiped out by fire this morning. Several buildings of the firm, which deals in hay, straw and grain, were burned to the ground. The only structure that was saved was one containing several carloads of potatoes. The loss is estimated at \$20,000. Three of the buildings were not insured.

But for the heavy rainfall yesterday a large part of the residential sections of Franklin and Monmouth streets probably would have been destroyed by the burning embers which fell over this section. The origin of the fire is unknown, but the authorities believe it was the work of an incendiary.

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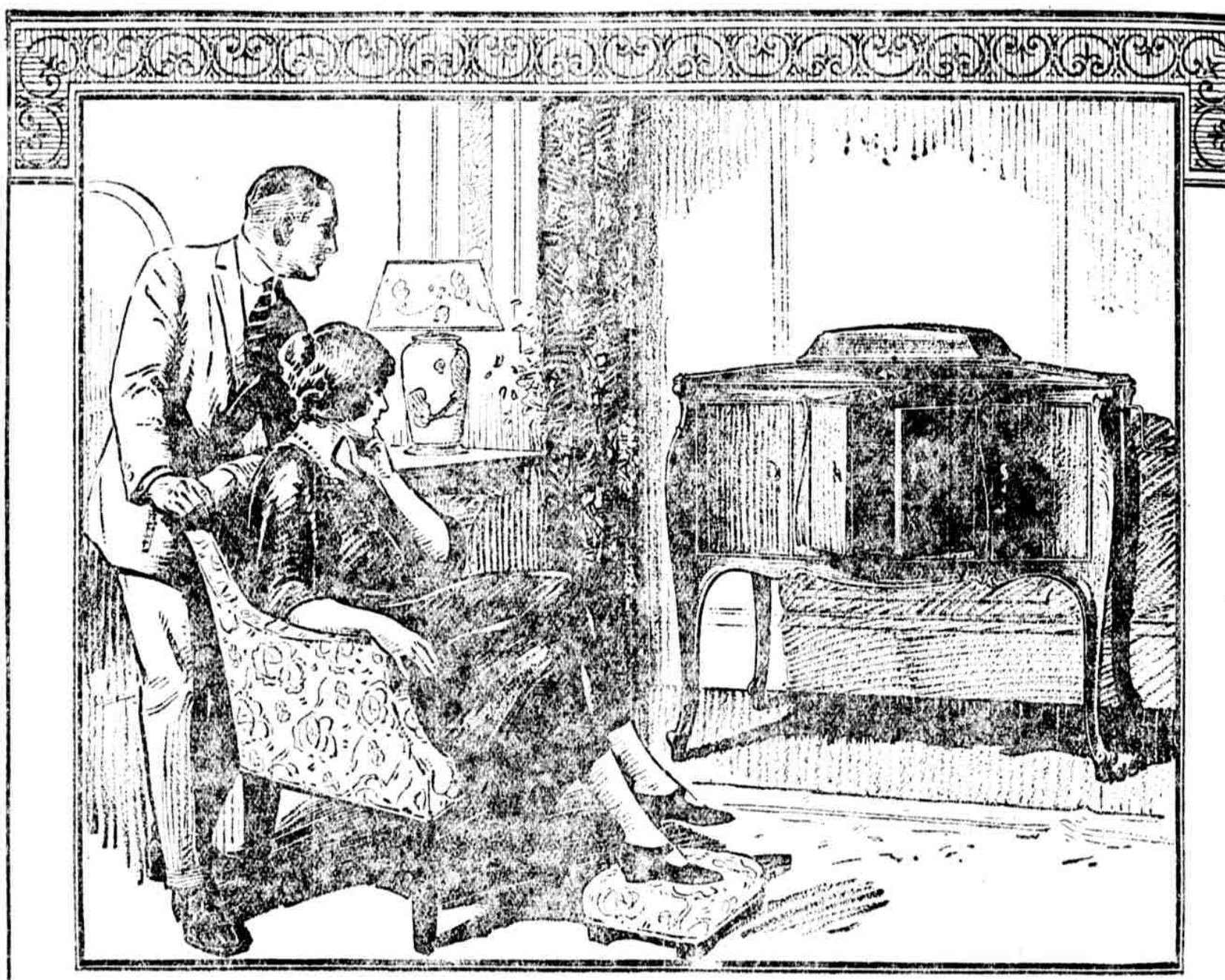
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
