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WHARTON SCHOOL RESUMES EXAMS
Brief Period of Discontinuance Failed to Produce Results Beneficial to Study

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SOCIAL SCIENCE MEETING

Examinations in the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania, which were discontinued last year as an experiment, will be resumed again this year. The faculty of the school has decided.

That decision brings to an end temporarily an experiment which was being watched in educational circles throughout the country. The object in discontinuing the final and midyear examinations was to prevent "cramming" before examinations, and to put in place of the "exams" the instructor's judgment of the students' work and quizzes at short intervals.

But the system did not work so well in practice as it seemed. Some teachers at the end of the term gave examinations to their classes which were fully the equal of the abolished "exams" in every way, and there was a difference of opinion among faculty members as to the wisdom of abolishing the examinations.

The elimination of the "exams" had the hearty support of Dr. Emory Johnson, dean of the Wharton School, who is now in South America on a mission for the Government and is the representative of the United States Chamber of Commerce. Dr. Johnson was in an important device for saving time and labor.

Early last summer a committee was appointed to look into the matter thoroughly. Prof. J. H. Williams was chairman of that committee and it was on the basis of a report submitted by the committee to a faculty meeting last month that it was decided to bring back the examinations.

An official statement issued after the faculty meeting declared: "The Wharton School faculty has voted to discontinue the experiment tried out during the last scholastic year of abolishing final examinations. Under the system it was found that the Wharton School was working upon a different schedule from other departments. That difference caused administrative difficulties which seemed to be unavoidable and which have caused the system to be discontinued."

Many prominent students of political science and economics in this country will attend a special meeting of the American Academy of Political and Social Science in honor of the late Dr. Simon Nelson Patten, one of the founders of the academy and professor of economics in the University of Pennsylvania, next Saturday night in Widener Hall, Walnut and Juniper streets.

Among the speakers will be representatives of various of the larger economic and sociological associations in the country. Dr. L. S. Rowe, president of the American Academy of Political and Social Science, will speak for the academy. Dr. Joseph H. Darniman, acting provost of the University of Pennsylvania, will represent the University.

Other speakers will be Dr. Samuel McClure Lindsay, president of the Academy of Political Science in the City of New York; Dr. Henry R. Seager, president of the American Economic Association; Dr. Lightner Wittmer, of the American Economic Association; and Dr. Paul W. Kellogg, of the Survey Association.

George W. Stearns, a graduate of Merceburg Academy, was elected president of the sophomore class at the University of Pennsylvania yesterday.

Other officers elected were: High King, vice president; E. Paul Norris, secretary; Samuel H. French, treasurer; and Milton Davis, historian. The following were chosen as members of the Executive Committee: M. V. Browning, Jr., chairman; A. S. Gwertz, J. Edward Graffmiller and G. J. Mathews.
