

# PRINCESS TO SHUN KAISER'S WEDDING

Wife of ex-Emperor's Heir Declines to Attend Ceremony at Doorn

## NOTED FOR INDEPENDENCE

Berlin, Oct. 27. — According to authoritative information here, ex-Crown Princess Cecilie will be conspicuously missing at the ex-Kaiser's wedding. The absence of her name from the list of prospective guests, furnished by the Kaiser's court yesterday, is not accidental. The Princess, who is living with her children in her Potsdam palace, holds decided views on the remarriage of her august father-in-law to a bride younger than herself, and all attempts to induce her to change her mind and attend the Doorn ceremony for the sake of appearances have failed. The efforts are still continuing, as the ex-Kaiser's friends and the Hohenzollerns, however, are familiar of old with Princess Cecilie's independence, which was manifested even before the war, when the authority of the Kaiser and Kaiserin over their family and court was almost absolute. That independence was shown even in such minor details as the Crown Princess' refusal to follow the Kaiser's instructions to wear German clothes. She insisted, instead, on going to Paris for her apparel. Objected to Castle. Again her spirit was shown when she declined to follow the Hohenzollern precedent and live in one of the damp, chilly, antiquated Hohenzollern castles in Potsdam and insisted upon having a modern residence with hot and cold water, plumbing, bathrooms and central heating, built where she might "live as comfortably as the general run of the future subjects." The children of the Prince are said

to be of the same mind as their mother. A reported remark of one of the boys, "We have no use for these new uncles," referring to the sons of the new bride by her first marriage—is circulating in Potsdam society. Princess Cecilie's social rank is affected by the ex-Kaiser's remarriage, though it is only a formal effect as long as there is no court and no court society in Germany. The Kaiserin's death made her the first lady of the land as far as court ceremonial for the adherents of the old regime were concerned, giving her precedence over all other royal ladies in Germany. The ex-Kaiser's new spouse will assume that position upon her marriage, since, by court etiquette, she is a full-fledged consort of His Majesty.

**Ceremony Planned**  
Court Chaplain Vogel has received from the ex-Kaiser full instructions concerning details of the wedding ceremony and the address which he is to deliver to the couple after their marriage in accordance with the German custom. The instructions, which are in the ex-Kaiser's own hand, cover three large quarto sheets of paper. The program is minutely described. It indicates Princess Herminie is scheduled to arrive in Amerongen on the afternoon of November 4, driven to Doorn on Sunday at 10.30 and received at the gates of the park by the Kaiser's suite and all the members of the Hohenzollern family present. The civil ceremony should be fully binding when it is considered that it will be performed by a burgomaster with the imposing name of Baron von Schlimmelpenninck van der Oyer van Hooft. Additional guests are the ex-Kaiser's sister, Margarete; the Princess of Hesse and the Prince of Pless.
