

MERION SERGEANT'S DEMOTION UPHeld

Township Commissioners Failed to Present Specific Charges Against Robinson

SESSION CALLED REHEARING

Commissioners of Lower Merion township chose last night to uphold the demotion of Sergeant David Robinson to patrolman without presenting specific charges against him rather than name the charges and hear a defense on his appeal for reinstatement.

Robinson's demotion, after he had attempted to serve a warrant on James A. Eumon, wealthy coal operator, now held in \$2,500 bail for running down and killing a man with his automobile, stirred up a hornet's nest of criticism in all the Main Line communities.

Robinson was demoted by the police committee September 20. The committee's decision was appealed to the township commissioners by Robinson and his attorney, J. M. McDevitt, on September 21. The commissioners said that the case was not ready for a hearing.

Robinson's attorney, J. M. McDevitt, said that the demotion was a punishment for a crime which Robinson had committed. He said that Robinson was a man of high character and that his demotion was a disgrace.
