Catholic's Opening on Saturday Brings Last of Local Circuits Into Action

With the Catholic League football circuit on Saturday afternoon the three local school circuits are all in action. The schoolboys themselves have started their little debates regarding the probable winners in each circuit.

In the Public High School League three teams are in the running. One is fairly strong, while the other two will be lucky to capture a pair or even one game.

Central High takes fight, which is the only thing that prevents it from being a winning team, and Northeast High lacks material. They are the only weak links in the league.

Pioneers Again Proved Frankford High, the team that last year brought the title to the Pioneer school for the first time in the history of the institution, should again finish in the front.

This year's eleven is not as strong as the championship one, but it has the right plus football ability, and one man who stands out like the Rock of Gibraltar—Paul Weekes, its captain.

In the two games which already have been played in the right side of the ledger West Philadelphia ran the team to such an advantage and also plays so brilliantly that his ability stands out as one of the features of the League.

Southern High, through its victory over the Cliversons on Friday afternoon, looks as the "dark horse" of the circuit, and the Speedways and Pioneers probably will lose a night or so of sleep prior to their games with the downtown team.

Speedboys in Running West Philadelphia High, despite its opening day defeat, is not out of the running. It was a case of over-confidence, and Coach Delaplane is of the opinion that his team will make it hot for last year's champions before the circuit is completed.

In the Catholic League it is a hard race to choose between four of the five teams in the circuit. All have been undefeated to date and one has yet to lose its goal line crosses. The strongest of the three, Catholic High, St. Joseph Prep, Villanova Prep and West Catholic High are the huskies of the circuit.

Another thing that favors the Main Line bunch is that the Quakers are not as strong as the last three teams representing the Twelfth street school and have already been beaten this year by Lansdowne High, Germantown Academy, St. Luke's and Episcopal Academy, all not expected to play any prominent part in the battle for the title.
