HALLOWEEN ELVES READY FOR PRANKS

Merrymakers Have Costumes Ready for Yearly Frolic Throughout City

MANY EVENTS ARE LISTED

Tonight is Halloween! Small boys and girls, as well as grown-ups, will forget their usual pleasures tonight to attend grotesque parties and parades that come only on the evening which precedes All Saints' Day.

As soon as darkness falls over the city the younger element will venture forth to indulge in their favorite pastime of doorbell pulling, known to their country brothers and sisters as "bell snickling." Wild-looking goblins will parade the streets carrying candle-lighted jack-o'-lanterns.

Down at the Navy Yard the "gobs" are scheduled to have the best time for many a week, when Monday Moore gives a party in the Marine Recreation Center. Prizes for the best costumes will be awarded by Captain Day, Charles Stone, Mr. and Mrs. W. Franklin Kessler, Dr. Marshall B. McIntire and Mr. and Mrs. Richard Weirlein.

The prizes to be given out by the Lancaster Avenue Business Men's Association amount to \$200. Representatives of the social and athletic clubs in the neighborhood will serve as judges. Thousands are expected to witness the parade staged by the Fifty-second and Market Streets United Merchants' Association. Its West Philadelphia prizes amounting to \$500 will be awarded. Following the parade a dance will be held in the new Philadelphia Arena.

The business men of Chester avenue, between Fifty-fourth and Fifty-eighth streets, promised to outfit anything of the kind ever staged in that community. One of their prizes will be given for the best representation of a flapper.

Parades will be held by the North Philadelphia Avenue Business Men's Association between Lehigh avenue and Westmoreland street on Friday evening, and by the Toga Business Men's Club in Toga. As elsewhere, prizes will be offered for the best costumes and floats.

In Germantown the Halloween celebrators will assemble at the Boys' Club at 7:30 o'clock and thirty minutes later start to parade west on Fifth street as far as Green. Several floats will be in line. A number of Halloween celebrations were held last night in various sections of the city. In the central district, however, there was a noticeable absence of masked dance-makers on the streets. Tonight it is expected that thousands of persons will crowd the main thoroughfares as floats go by.

400 DOUGHNUTS CONSUMED

Not on a Bet, but in Blaze in Hancock Bakery Today. Explosion of a vat of oil in the bakery of Hancock Brothers Baking Company, Fifty-second and Market streets, at 10 o'clock this morning, resulted in the loss of 400 doughnuts. The grease in which the doughnuts were being fried became overheated and flared up, igniting the wall of the baker's room.
