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TITTA RUFFO SCORES A HUGE SUCCESS IN CONCERT

Italian Baritone Sings Before En thusiastic Audience at Metropolitan

Titta Ruffo last evening scored as emphatic a success before a Philadeiphia audience as has been achieved by any singer for many years. He appeared in the Metropolitan Opera House, which was fairly well filled as regards numbers, but filled to overflowing with respect to enthusiasm.

Mr. Ruffo sang four numbers—that is there were four on the program, but he sang fourteen times in all—and these numbers were the cream of the baritone repertoire. All were operatic and came in this order: The Prologue from "Pagliacci," the Torcador song from "Carmen," the Drinking song from "Hamlet" and the "Largo al Factotum" from the "Barber of Seville." These four numbers give play to about every possible human emotion and afford the singer a rare opportunity to distinguish himself—if he is capable of doing so—with such a varied emotional and vocally exacting program. Mr. Ruffo showed last evening that he can do it. All the numbers were placed on the program by request of Ruffo's Philadelphia admirers.

The great Italian baritone was in good voice and he displayed his usual frolicaomeness on the stage, which always makes a great hit with his audience. He is essentially an operatic rather than a lyric singer and, therefore, he could not have selected a program which suited his voice nor his mood of last evening better than did the four great arias he gave. In voice and in certain temperamental capacities he is easily the king of the baritones.

The audience was wildly enthusiastic and Mr. Ruffo was more than generous in giving encores. He did not thrust his extra songs on the audience by any manner of means, but when he saw that they were clearly desired, he gave them cheerfully. Of all the numbers, he was at his best in the aria from "The Barber," both vocally, in spirit and especially in the matter of enunciation, taking the aria at a terrific tempo in the second part with every syllable as distinctly pronounced as though the tempo were slow. It was a vertitable tour de force of singing. As usual, Mr. Ruffo acted the arias as t

followed this immediately with a lovely composition entitled "Nebbie" (Clouds), by one of the most gifted of the modern Italian composers, Respighi, whose orchestral composition, "The Fountains of Rome," presented by Toscanini, was one of the features of last evening. Miss d'Allesandro also sang Donizetti's "O mio Fernando" and the heautiful "O Don Fatale" of Verdi, responding with well-chosen encores to all.

Mr. Sciarretti, formerly one of the conductors of the San Carlo Opera Company, was the accompanist and appeared twice in solos, doing both with conspicuous success.

Why It Is Possible For Us to Float When Bathing

It is possible for people to float when bathing because the specific gravity of ordinary water is just about the same as the specific gravity of the human body. Archimides, who lived in the third century, discovered specific gravity. Hiero, King of Syra-

When the crown was finished the king suspected that the workmen had stolen part of the gold and added some silver in its place, but he could not prove this because they had made it weigh exactly as much as the pure gold. Archimides, who was asked to investigate, found who was asked to investigate, found the king was right. He secured a ball of pure gold and one of pure silver, each weighing exactly as much as the crown. He put the gold ball into a vessel of water and marked on the side of the vessel the height to which the water rose. He next put the silver ball into the water and again marked the height of the water. He showed thus that, although both weighed the same. that, although both weighed the same, the water rose higher when the silver was immersed.

Lastly, he took out the silver and

put the crown into the water. If the crown had been of pure gold the water should have risen to the gold mark. The water, however, rose higher than the pure gold mark, but not so high as the




