

MOTT WILL ASK 3 INDICTMENTS

Only Male Names on Writ in Hall-Mills Murder Probe

WOMAN NEW WITNESS

By a Staff Correspondent New Brunswick, N. J., Nov. 18.—Indictments will be sought against persons for the murder of the Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall and Mrs. Eleanor R. Mills, who the Somerset County Grand Jury meets on Monday.

As one of the three legal pseudonyms is a feminine name, Deputy Attorney General Mott was asked if that meant no indictment would be asked against a woman. He would make no comment.

The writ of habeas corpus, obtained by Mr. Mott directed the Sheriff to produce Raymond Schneider before the Grand Jury on Monday.

Investigators will not state whether Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall, the reporter's widow, will be given the opportunity to appear at the grand jury.

Evidence that Mrs. Hall was co-tenant of the relations between her husband and Mrs. Mills will be offered to the grand jury.

CLEMENCEAU AGAIN VISITS SCENE OF EARLY STRUGGLE

"Tiger" Renews Acquaintances of Fifty Years Ago Before Beginning American Lecture Tour

New York, Nov. 18.—(By A. P.)—Georges Clemenceau, the French "Tiger," came to this country for the first time more than fifty years ago to see what a republic really looks like.

M. Clemenceau is here again, but unofficially to present the cause of France to the American people, and this he will do in the languages of the masses, for he is a master of his tongue.

It was back in 1842 that young Dr. Clemenceau, just turned twenty-five, first stepped ashore in New York.

Back of him, he believed, lay his political career, which was not without further temptations along the same line upon gaining his freedom.

Promised a small monthly remittance from his father, the future was bright for the young man.

"Do you feel better?" "I couldn't ever feel better. I always feel better."

"I don't need to be invigorated. I am always invigorated."

"And now you are gratified, are you not?" he asked.

"All right. Good-by."

"We are you coming to America?" turned mildly and politely replied:

"No message at all—to anybody."

"But I have a mission," he said slowly. "It is a mission that I gave myself. I will tell you about it when I speak at the Metropolitan Opera House on Tuesday night."

Clemenceau parried all attempts to get him to discuss economic or diplomatic subjects.

"I remember well my days in Connecticut," he said. "I should like to get back here while I am here, but I do not know if I can. And I remember New York. I used to live on Seventh street near Sixth avenue. Now they tell me there is no Seventh street."

"And I expect to see many, many changes. When I lived here, many showed only their heads and their ears and their tails. Now I understand it is not so. Yes, now it's very different."

M. Clemenceau will live in the home of the Charles Dana Gibsons at 127 Fifth avenue during his stay here, and will spend enough time in retirement to conserve his strength for the public appearances which he has arranged.
