Washington, Nov. 27.—President Harding addressed an appeal to the Government of the States today for the observance of Sunday, December 3, at Near East emergency day.

He suggested that through co-operation with the Mayors of cities and other public and civic authorities, the day be observed with the special purpose of directing attention to the need for substantial relief through the American organization established for that end.
