CALL GRANT KLAN ACT NO PRECEDENT

K. K. K. Official Refers to Investigation Held Last Year

PLACARD PARKER'S HOUSE

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 28.—President Grant's action in ordering the Ku Klux Klan of Reconstruction days to disband does not offer a precedent for similar action, in the view of Fred Savage, chief of staff under Colonel William J. Simmons, imperial wizard of the present Klan organization.

In a statement here last night commenting on the move by Senator Walsh, of Massachusetts, to bring about a proclamation by President Harding calling upon the present Ku Klux Klan to disband, Mr. Savage said: "Senator Walsh is apparently asking that the Klan be disbanded solely on the basis of its name."

Mr. Savage was prepared at present to make no detailed statement in regard to his request, he said, "but I would like to refer him to the congressional investigation of the Klan last year, in which it was found that there is no analogy between the Ku Klux Klan which was disbanded by order of President Grant and the Klan as it is being operated under present conditions."

President Grant's action, for that reason, does not offer a precedent for similar action today.

Mr. Savage stated that he did not know whether the Imperial Klux Klan of the Klan, now in possession here, would take official notice of Senator Walsh's request.

Baton Rouge, La., Nov. 28.—By A. P.—The house occupied by Governor John M. Parker was plundered during the night of Nov. 27 by a large organization, members of the Baton Rouge Ku Klux Klan scheduled for Thanksgiving night, Governor Parker is reported to the Klan.


