Yellowjacket Gridders Are Out to Make It Eleven Straight Victories

Visitors' Team Is Speedy

The Frankford Yellowjackets' strongest rival for Eastern titles honors in the independent football field, the New York Giants, will try to break the winning streak of the big Northeast eleven, now ten games, at Brown's Field, Oxford avenue near the boulevard, this afternoon.

Helmie Miller's proteges are out to make the visitors "eat crow" instead of the well-known Thanksgiving-Dinner bird.

The Giants are a well-coached eleven and their record, so far this season shows that they will not be a passive stepping stone to further the Yellowjackets' ambitions. Manager Rochan, of the Giants, also has the title he is capable of defeating Frankford's best.

The visitors' team is composed of former college stars who have played together all season. The Giants boast two fast and flashy ends in Albrecht, former of Brown, and Schuman, a Yale product, and it will be interesting to watch how they stack up against Miller and Thomas, the Yellowjackets' ends, who have played spectacular ball all season.

Shurtell, the big center from Brown, should provide the toughest kind of competition for Lind Wray, the former Penn luminary. The rest of the Giants, with Moran, Georgetown; Peterson, Brown; Case, Holy Cross, and Lynch, Holy Cross, is strong, but the line line appears to have a slight edge.

In the visiting backfield, Bornstein, the big fullback, who gained All-Southern honors at Louisiana State, is a hard man to stop. Manager Rochan remarked yesterday he might have Eddie Minner and Casey, the former Harvard stars, to bolster up his team.

The Yellowjackets' line-up will be the same that started against the Rochester Tigers. Jefferson, the center, will start at fullback, Davies and Lightner, halfbacks, and Johnny Scott at quarterback. Lou Little and Joe Williams will play the guard positions, and Ed Sporna at the third position.


