FEASTS IN THE HOSPITALS

Thanksgiving was observed throughout the city yesterday with the customary schedule of church-going in the morning, attendance at various athletic events in the afternoon and much feasting at groaning tables in the early afternoon and evening.

The holiday was a quiet one for the most part, with family reunion dinners as the pivotal point of the celebration. As it was a legal holiday, all State, county and municipal offices, banks, the Stock Exchange and the majority of the business houses remained closed.

In the morning the central section of the city was enlivened by the presence of many visitors who came here to attend the University of Pennsylvania-Cornell game on Franklin Field. Many of the out-of-town football enthusiasts sported red feathers decorated with a white "C" in their hats, which vied with the Red and Blue pennants carried by the Pennsylvania "rooters."

Many hospitals had special dinners for the shut-ins. Among those that featured Thanksgiving menus were the West Philadelphia Hospital for Women, Hahnemann, Roosevelt, Germantown, Northwestern General and University. Donation day was observed at St. Agnes' and the Abington Memorial Hospitals.

Seventy-five grocery orders were sent to the homes of invalids by the Shut-in Society. In addition 700 garments were distributed by the organization.

At the Home of Industry, Seventy-third street and Paschall avenue, many former inmates returned to join in the holiday celebration. Baskets were sent out by the Old York Road Public Health Center, Jenkintown. Many dinners were given in

the House of Industry, 716 Catharine street.

One of the fullest programs of the day was that of the Germantown Boys' Club. The events included a cross-country run, a memorial service, a football game and a dramatic entertainment.

Deeds of mercy had a prominent place in the "day of devotion" the Salvation Army conducted. Salvationists in the Tenderloin found 130 homeless men who had no prospect of obtaining a Thanksgiving dinner. These unfortunates received tickets and at 5 o'clock they flocked into Evangeline Hall where a turkey dinner awaited them.

In the course of the day seventy-five baskets containing Thanksgiving dinners were sent from the Philadelphia headquarters, Broad street and Fair-

mount avenue, to as many poor families.

Commissioner and Mrs. Thomas Estill, of New York, conducted religious services in the afternoon and evening in the Memorial Auditorium.

Many poor families in Kensington were made happy yesterday by Mrs. M. W. Ketchum. Starting Wednesday night and continuing yesterday, 438 baskets were delivered to homes of needy persons by trucks and Boy Scouts from the Kensington Neighborhood House at 3008 Frankford avenue, where Mrs. Ketchum is in charge.

Each basket contained a roast of beef, half a peck of potatoes, a quarter peck of turnips, celery, a pint of onions, a head of cabbage, cans of tomatoes, corn and milk, a pound each of rice and beans, half a pound each of coffee and tea and a pound of sugar.
