

DURANT MOTORS BID TO NEW TOP ON CURB

Low Par Oil Stocks in Increased Demand—Schulte Stores Strong

New York, Dec. 2.—The market on the curb held generally firm in the two hours of trading today, with some lesser continuing the upward movement that has been in progress since the beginning of the week.

Durant Motors moved up to a new high level, selling at 19 1/2. The action of this stock, in connection with the strength in Studebaker on the New York Stock Exchange, was thought to be a harbinger of a general recovery of the automobile industry.

Inter-continental Rubber was another feature, advancing to 5 1/2 as a natural sequence to the continued strength in crude rubber and in the record-breaking demand for that product.

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The new \$2 1/2 par value shares were in increased demand, a feature being Standard Oil of New York, which rose to 40 1/2, was another feature, with new strength, was in demand and moved up to the highest price touched in several months.
