DAUGHERTY URGES LARGER LAW FORCE

Increase Necessary, He Says, to Handle Augmented Work of Department

60,722 CASES LAST YEAR

Washington, Dec. 7.—A new basic judicial organization, to meet the augmented work which has resulted from "the ever-increasing complexity of Government," was suggested by Attorney General Daugherty in his annual report, made public today. Noting that 60,722 criminal cases were begun in the last fiscal year, the report declared the point was being approached "where a revamping of the machinery used in this work is inevitable."

Adoption of some method by which the Government could retain attorneys who have special knowledge of Government matters in addition to legal training, was one of the several suggestions advanced by Mr. Daugherty. The recently enacted legislation providing additional judges should help the situation, he said, but probably will not entirely remedy it.

"The failure of local self-government in parts of the country," the report said, "results in the assistance of the citizens of those communities that the Federal Government perform that function in which the local Government has failed. The two generals were the chief speakers at a patriotic dinner of the Association of Commerce, and a few minutes later General Pershing

General Pershing took up discussion of the general defense. "Some day war will come," he admonished with pointing finger, "some day war will come, and we must consider national defense."

Two resolutions, one introduced by General Dawes, were adopted by the meeting. General Dawes' resolution condemned Governor Small for release of William Bross Lloyd, wealthy radi-

cal, and sixteen associates from the State prison. The other resolution called upon the Government to maintain a standing army of 150,000 men.

PERSHING OFFERS PLEA FOR GREATER U. S. DEFENSE

Dawes Condemns Gov. Small for Release of Radical, W. B. Lloyd

KU KLUX KLANSMEN RAID ALLEGED GAMBLING PLACES

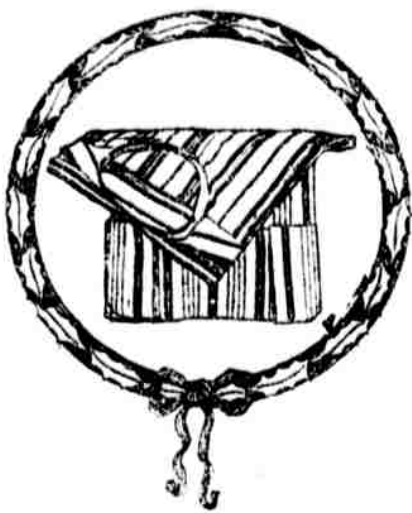
Ten Automobiles of Hooded Members Break Up Games in Cressona
