Edison Citizens Move to Avert More Accidents at Dangerous Curve

OLD YORK ROAD NEWS Citizens of Edison, on the Easton highway north of Willow Grove, have filed an appeal with officials of Bucks County, urging that additional preventive measures against motor accidents be made effective at the Edison Bridge.

The approach to the bridge is at the foot of a steep hill, with almost a right angle at the base of the hill. A high stone wall has been built, and there is a sheer drop of twenty feet to the meadows. In two of the four accidents, the wall was shattered and cars and occupants hurled to the meadows. The curve is regarded as one of the most dangerous points in Bucks County.

"SUSPECT LAW" SURPASSED Hungarian Measure Outdoes Notorious French Revolution Statute

Vienna, Dec. 8.—(By A. P.)—The notorious "suspect law" of the French Revolution is surpassed by a bill just introduced in the Hungarian Parliament by the Hungarian Government calling for "greater protection of the public order."

Under the bill the Government would receive power to banish, intern or send to the workhouse any person "whose attitude or activities are detrimental to the public order."
