

CHARGES \$5,000,000 HIGHWAY WASTE

Huge State Loss Alleged by Charles A. Waters, Counsel for Contractors

INADEQUATE LAWS BLAMED

Harrisburg, Dec. 14. (By Staff Writers.)—The \$5,000,000 loss was caused by inadequate laws under which the highway system is being constructed, according to a special report read today before the special meeting of the Associated Pennsylvania Highway Contractors and the Public Works Construction Industry of Pennsylvania.

"The construction of highways in Pennsylvania has become a black market," Mr. Waters declared. "Responsible and adequate laws have been drawn from operation in Pennsylvania. Many have engaged in highway work in other States, where adequate laws and more favorable conditions obtain. Pennsylvania is the only State in the Union which is operating under legislation designed for poor roads."

The report of Mr. Waters is said to be the first of the kind for remedial legislation to be drafted during the approaching session of the Legislature. It outlines a number of bills proposed for the consideration of the Legislature.

"I have never known legislation enacted to match the progress of State highway construction," the State highway engineer declared. "The State highway program is being carried out at a rate which is far in excess of the laws which govern it."

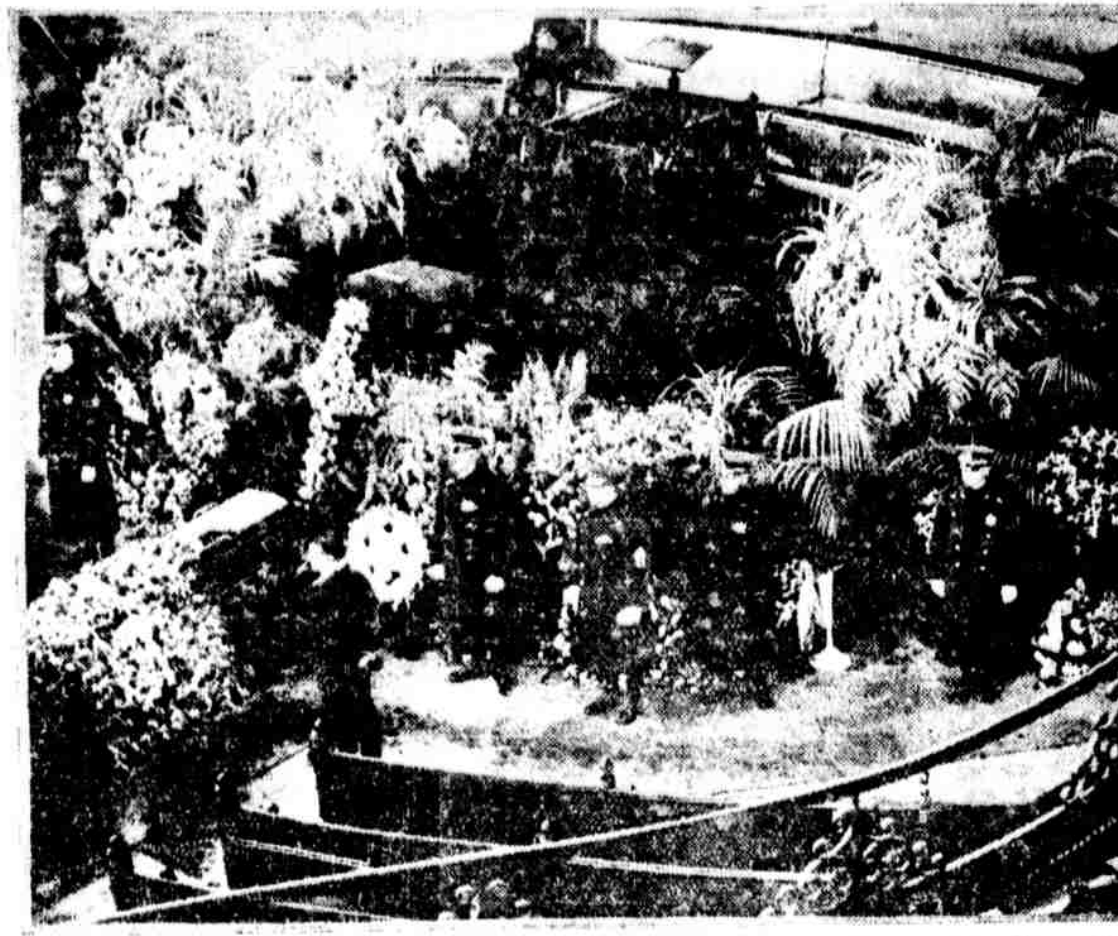
