

BUSINESS BODY GETTING NEW LIFE

South Philadelphia Association Starts Campaign for More Members HAS LARGE PROGRAM

A revival of the South Philadelphia Business Men's Association, which until just before the outbreak of the World War was one of the most active bodies of its kind in the city, will be undertaken by a group of men interested in the welfare and development of South Philadelphia.

Appreciating the necessity of having an organization strong enough to carry through plans for many needed improvements a reorganizing meeting of the association has been called for tomorrow night at 1902 South Broad street by a committee composed of Walter H. Phillips, chairman; Charles P. Shuler, Judge MacNelle, John H. Bisher and Robert J. Allen.

A strong appeal for new members is contained in a circular distributed by the committee and which sets forth the needs of South Philadelphia, as follows:

"The extension of trolley lines, including the continuation of the elevated road from South street down Delaware avenue to Oregon avenue, to Broad street. A trolley line over Passyunk avenue bridge to Sixty-third street and Woodland avenue. The abolition of the one-man trolley control and a great number of all-clip-stops. Removal of the dangerous grade crossings.

"Clean and well-lighted streets. Better police protection. Development of the League Island section. The completion of the belt line by the Pennsylvania Railroad, as set forth in the original plan and agreement, and not as it is now contemplated.

"Adequate sewers to be installed, so as not to retard building operations now in progress and to take care of the future. Suitable sidewalks to be erected to relieve the present congested condition. More lights in sections where the present illumination is poor. And a list of other improvements that directly affect the comfort of the business interests of this section."

BAR TOBACCO AND MOVIES

Russian Evangelical Church Here Forbids Both to its Members

Going to the motion pictures is punishable by dismissal in the Russian Evangelical Church, which conducts services every Sunday morning and evening in the Fifth Street Methodist Temple, Fifth street above Spring garden.

The use of tobacco in any form is another transgression likely to bring the "offender" before a church court. From seventy-five to one hundred Russians attend the services in the Fifth Street Temple. In former years they were part of the Polish Baptist Church, but the Poles, several years ago, decided they wanted to conduct services in their native language. Thereupon the Russians formed a separate congregation.

After-Dinner Tricks



No. 34—Water That Sticks The performer holds a glass of water in his hand as shown in Figure A. He states that he will turn the tumbler upside down without spilling any of the water. Of course, every one wants to see it done.

Hold the tumbler at arm's length, swing the arm then complete revolution, or circle, just as indicated in Figures A, B and C. The sweep of the arm should be made rather rapidly, so that the force of motion of the tumbler keeps it from spilling. Thus the glass is turned upside down without spilling the water.

Practice the proper motion with an empty tumbler. Do not put too much water in the tumbler when doing the trick.
