HOLD-UP MEN TAKE CLERK'S XMAS FUND

Two Work Calmly in Drug Store While Scores Pass By on Street

\$4000 IN CLOTHING STOLEN

Two robbers walked calmly into Irwin's pharmacy, on the busy corner of Frankford avenue and Sellers street, last night and held the clerk at the point of a pistol while they rifled the cash register and went through the employer's pockets.

From one clerk, Herman Schmitt, they took \$1000, his Christmas money, and from the other, Frank Morlock, they got \$200. The cash register yielded them another \$110. No customers were in the store at the time of the robbery, but many persons were passing on the street. The hold-up men, two well-dressed young men, worked in plain view of the street and appeared to be in no hurry to finish the job. They listened to an automobile strolling on Sellers street and stood away. The robbery occurred at 10:30 o'clock.

Robbers Use Teamwork When the robbers came in I went out to wait on them, Morlock said this morning. As I walked up to them they showed his pistol against my chest and told me to keep my hands on the wall. For a moment I thought I was some kind of a fool. The fellow who was guarding me told the other one to get the lady in the prescription department and while he was gone he took away my Christmas money. I handed him \$1000 cents. He then began going through my pockets, all the time holding the gun against my stomach with one hand. He got \$200 out of me and then I told him in quietest voice that I had a gun in my pocket.

He had no doubt about the gun in the front of the store, where another clerk, Frank Morlock, was working. If he wanted to get the gun he had to get it from me. He took it and then he told me to get out of the store. Mrs. Schmitt, who was in the prescription department, had just taken to the bank and had \$1000 in her pocket. I told her to get out of the store. She took the \$1000 and went to the bank. She was the only one who was not hurt.

Tricks and Clothing Stolen

Police of the 21st and 22nd precincts station were notified by Schmitt and Morlock and they described the hold-up men to all police districts. One of the robbers appeared to be about thirty years old, slightly over five feet tall, and wore a gray overcoat and a hat. The other was about twenty years old. He wore a light-colored overcoat and a hat. He was about five feet tall and wore a dark overcoat and a hat. The clothing stolen was valued at \$4000 and the robbers escaped.

Two Negroes, 22 and 23 years old, have robbed several houses in the north part of the city during the last few days. One of the robbers appeared to be about thirty years old, slightly over five feet tall, and wore a gray overcoat and a hat. The other was about twenty years old. He wore a light-colored overcoat and a hat. He was about five feet tall and wore a dark overcoat and a hat. The clothing stolen was valued at \$4000 and the robbers escaped.

On arriving at a house they told the tenant they had been sent to make repairs to the roof or an upstairs room. As the man went up to the room they hid in a closet and waited until all of the furniture and clothing had been removed.

Later, the robbers returned to the house and they had come to make repairs to the second floor. After the man had gone upstairs Mrs. Baker told her father attention to the fact that the man had left the house she noticed several articles of clothing valued at \$200. Several pieces had been removed.

Clothing and money valued at \$225 was stolen from the home at Dornick's, 1240 South Chelmsford street, by the man who was arrested through a tip yesterday.

Three acts of clothing were stolen from the window of the store of Nathan Cooper, 1010 West Girard avenue, in the third and snatched it with a knife.

While the captain of the 21st precinct, 3650th and 3651st streets, was making a patrol on the street, he saw a man who was carrying a large bundle of clothing. He followed him and saw him enter a house. He arrested the man and found the clothing in the house.
