

**DRY RAIDERS START WILD FAMILY WAR**

Man Tells Officers His Wife Owns Still—"Liar," Is Re-tort-Uxorious

**ABOUT LASTS ONE ROUND**

Prohibition agents in a raid at the home of Vincent Dolichinski, 717th street near Cumberland, had to separate the man and his wife after he had accused her of owning a still found in the house. Mrs. Dolichinski yelled up the stairs when she heard her husband tell the raiders the still belonged to her. The woman hurried to the second floor of the house where the still was and fled at her husband. Prohibition officers separated them. In another raid yesterday Prohibition Agent E. Davis and two other agents were mistaken for second-story men when they were seen peering open a window at the Owl's Club, Rich-

mond and Cambria streets. Fourteen gallons of rye were found. Police arrested Mrs. Esther Herzog, fifty years of age, of Fairmount avenue near Second street, yesterday afternoon at Main and Levering streets, Manayunk, as she was carrying a basket containing a gallon of whiskey and two quarts of gin. She was turned over to the Federal authorities. Group Head McClure said she had been arrested three times before on charges of bootlegging.

**ALLENTOWN BOYS ORGANIZE TO BEAT THE "COAL TRUST"**

Picked Fuel From Trains and Sold It for 45 Cents for 100 Pounds Allentown, Pa., Dec. 15.—Half a dozen small boys, who naively confessed that they had organized to beat the anti-trust, were arrested this morning on the charge of stealing coal. The plan had its inception when one of the lads was sent out to pick coal on the railroad because his parents could not buy any for lack of it. A fuelless neighbor then paid him to pick coal for him. The boy then developed a scheme to organize a gang to take coal from the trains, which they sold at forty-five cents a hundred pounds, or about \$8 a ton. They acquired expensive wagons and sleds and developed a thriving business. Residents encouraged them because Allentown is virtually without coal in face of the fact that the city is only forty miles from the mines of thousands of tons passing through daily.

Admits Woman Is Dead and Changes Location of Plunge Into River

**30 OFFICERS WORK RELAYS**

Chicago, Dec. 15.—Arthur Foster, held in connection with the disappearance of Mrs. Kate Mitchell Trostell, telegraph branch office manager, under stress of simultaneous questioning by thirty detectives, early today, after he already had undergone nearly 100 hours of examination by officers working in relief details, changed his original statement regarding the alleged death of the woman. Early yesterday he told the officers drainage canal. Today he said that statement was wrong, but that the missing woman leaped into the water at a point one hundred yards away from the spot first indicated. A great squad

of policemen dragged the canal all yesterday for the body. The first change in Foster's demeanor came after a friend of Mrs. Trostell spent more than an hour reading to him from the Bible and after Mrs. Trostell's eleven-year-old daughter, faced him shortly after midnight with the accusation that he had murdered her mother and begged him to restore the body so it might be buried before Christmas. Until then officers said his attitude had been that of stolid indifference. After the little girl's plea, Foster was said to have admitted Mrs. Trostell

was dead, but denied he was responsible. He maintained she leaped into the canal. Stains on Foster's automobile were said by the coroner's chemist to have been blood, and in his motorcar detectives said they found a button from Mrs. Trostell's dress and a pencil such as she used.
