

TOWNS TO OPEN NEW ROAD LINK

Marcus Hook, Linwood and Booth Haven to Celebrate on Saturday

SPROUL MAY BE THERE

Governor Sproul, Governor-elect Pinchot, members of the State Highway Department and other prominent personages have been invited as guests of honor on the occasion of the road opening celebration to be held jointly by the three towns of Marcus Hook, Linwood and Booth Haven on Saturday afternoon, December 30. The celebration commemorates the completion of a State-aided highway.

This new concrete road is eighteen feet wide and effects a continuation of Market street, Marcus Hook. Beginning at the tracks of the Pennsylvania Railroad, the line divides between Marcus Hook and Linwood, it pierces Upper and Lower Chester Townships and terminates at a crossing of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, thus completing a roadway throughout all the way from the Delaware River, three miles northward to Boothaven.
