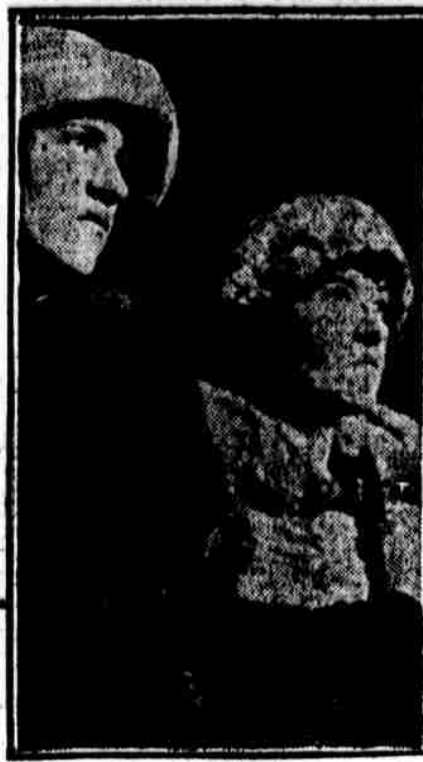

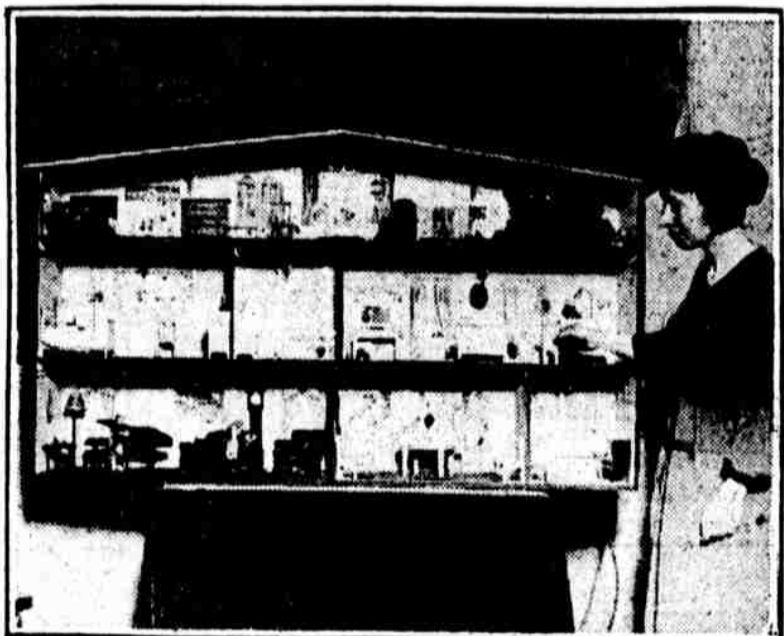
AS THE WHISTLE BLEW, Haverford and Media High Schools clashed at basketball yesterday. The camera caught the rival centers springing for the toss-up

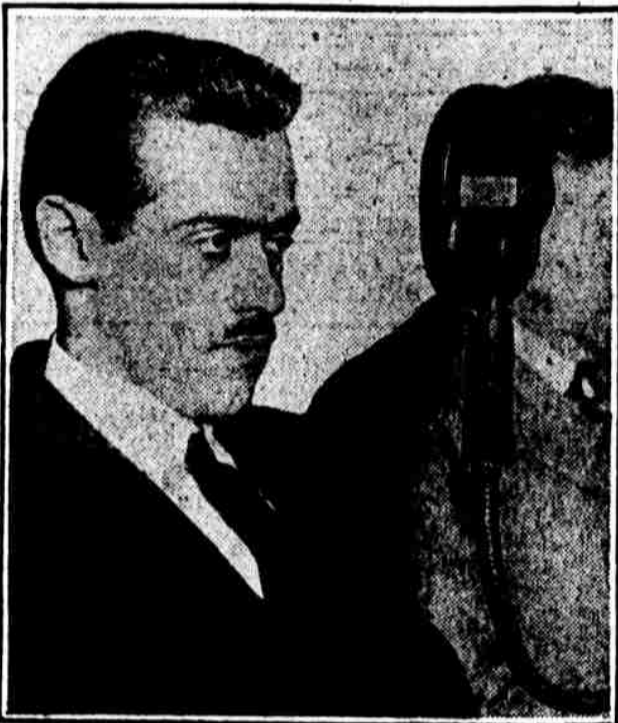

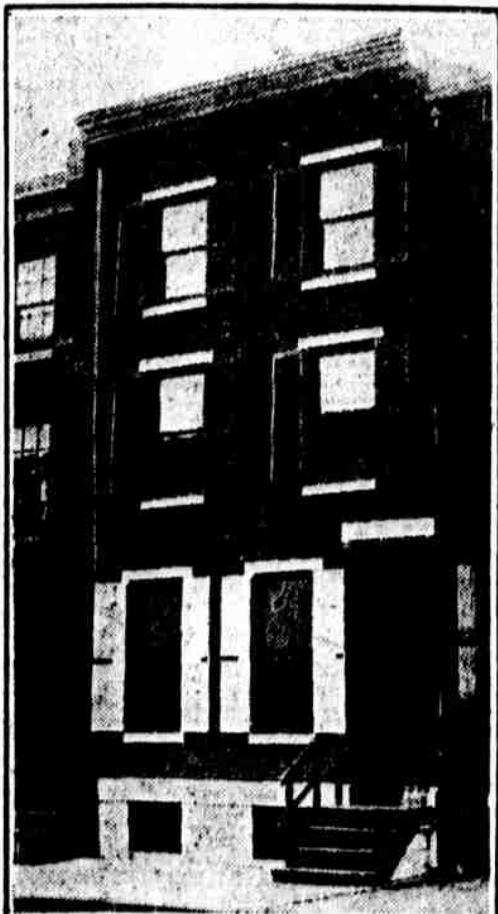
