



DRY CHRISTMAS MESSAGE But Haynes Would Omit Brimming Cup of Ancient Lore

Washington, Dec. 23 .- (By A. P.)-'Be of good cheer' was Prohibition Commissioner Haynes' Christmas mes-

sage today to "friends of the Eight-

eenth Amendment," in which he declared the success attained in prohibi-

tion enforcement gave "every reason for hopefulness, gratification and congrat-

ulations."
"Do not be deceived nor dismayed,"
said Mr. Haynes, "by a nation-wide
program of misrepresentation, constituting, as it does, the most pretentious,
most pernicious propaganda to undermine enforcement since the enactment

of the amendment.

"Admitting, of course, that there are violations of the Volstead act—unfortunately, by some who hold themselves above the law—the fact cannot and will not be conscientiously denied that

the last year has been marked with rapid strides toward the same degree of

enforcement of this law as obtains in respect to all other laws, none of which is enforced 100 per cent."
