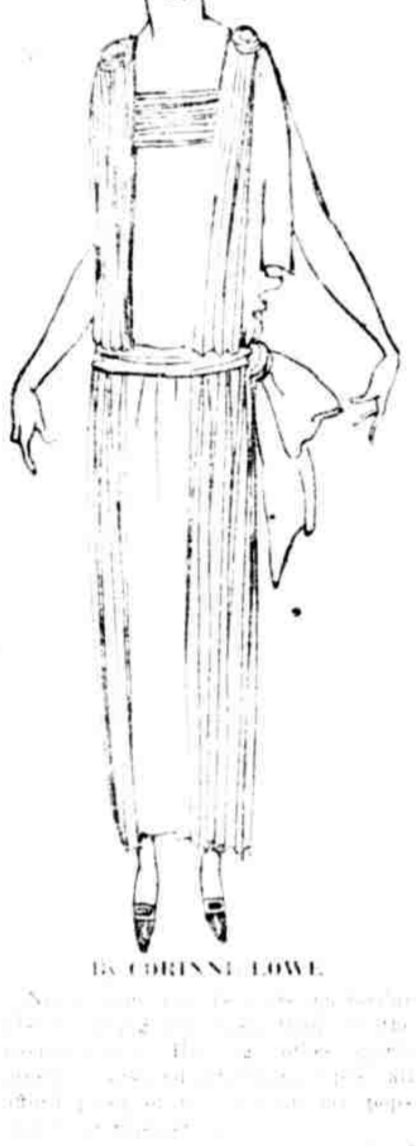

Sunday Menu for Three Meals on Sunday

Beet Salad: Place in a greasy pan, fry until done, drain on paper, and serve with a hot sauce.

Fruit Sauce: Place in a greasy pan, fry until done, drain on paper, and serve with a hot sauce.

Apple and Raisin Roll: Place in a greasy pan, fry until done, drain on paper, and serve with a hot sauce.

Half-pint packages of seedless raisins, separating each raisin. Grease the pan with butter. The raisins of raisins. Mix well to blend. Now place in separate bowl.
