'That the Judges and Inspectors, chosen aforesaid, shall meet at their respective places appointed for holding the election in district to which they respectively belong, before 9 o'clock on the morning of the 2nd Tuesday of October in each and every year, and each of the said Inspectors shall appoint one clerk, who shall be a qualified voter of said district."

"In case the person who shall receive the highest number of votes for Inspector, shall not attend on the day of any election, then the person who shall have received the sec-ond highest number of votes for Judge, at the next preceeding election shall act as Inspector in his place, and in case the person who shall have received the highest number of votes for Inspector shall not attend, the present elected Judge shall appoint an Inspector in his place, and in case the person elected Judge shall not attend, then the In-spector who received the highest number of votes shall appoint a Judge in his place; and if any vacancy shall continue in the board for the space of one hour after the time fixed by law for the opening of the election, the qualified voters of the township, warder district for which such officers shall have been elected, present at the place of election shall elect one of their number to fill such

"It shall by the duty of said Assessors, respectively to attend at the places holding every general, special or township election, during the time said election is open, for the purpose of giving information to the Inspec-tors and Judges, when called on, in relation to the rights of any person assessed by them to vote at such election, or such other matter in relation to the assessment of voters as the said Inspectors or Judges, or either of them,

"If any person shall vote at more than one election district, or otherwise fraudulently vote and deliver to the Inspector two tickets tegether, with the intent to illegally vote, or shall vote the same; or if any person shall advise or procure another to do so, he or they so offending, shall on conviction be fined in any sum not less than fifty nor more than five hundred dollars, and be imprisoned for any term not less than three nor more than twelve

"If any person not qualified to vote in this Comm this Commonwealth agreeably to the law, (excepting the sons of qualified citizens) shall appear at any place of election for the purpose of issuing tickets, or of influencing the citizens qualified to vote, he shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars for any such offence, and be imprisoned for any term not exceed ing three months.
