Sportsmen will do well to re member that there is a law against killing blue birds, swallows, robins or any other insectiverous birds at any season. The penalty for violating this law is five dollars for every offence. We print helow, Section 2nd of the game laws of this State. A careful

"No person shall shoot, kill, or otherwise destroy any pheasant between the 1st day of January and the 1st day of September or any woodcock between the 1st day of January and the first of July; or any partridge or rabbit between the 1st day of January and the 1st of October, under a penalty of five dollars for each offence."
