Last Monday and Tuesday were glad days in Belleronte. On Friday a despatch was received to the ef feet that the Fencibles would be at Lewistown and ready to start home on the following morning. Teams started immediately, and a short time afterward another despatch came stating that as they had failed to receive their pay and discharge, they could not come at the time designated in the first despatch. This occasioned considerable disny with news that it would be here in a few hours.
