### People's County Convention.

In pursuance to the regular call by the Chairman of the Executive Committee of the People's party of Centre county, the delegates assembled in the Court House on last Wednesday evening at the specified hour.

Resolved-That we hold it to be our duty as good and loyd citizens to sacrifice party feelings and preferences—all personal ambition and every desire for mere partizan success and to unite with all our fellow citizens, without regard to party organizations, who, devoted to the Union, and anxious for the major terms. ganizations, who, devoted to the canon, and anxious for the maintenance of our government, are willing to co operate with us in an endeavor to promote a loyal public sentiment throughout our whole country, to nominate and elect to offices of trust and profit in our midst and to represent us in a State Legislature, only such men as are of unquestioned ability and integrity and of unconditional Union sentiments. unquestioned abinty and ditional Union sentiments

Resolved, That our union of States being formed in peace and compromise, and here ofore maintained upon that basis as the pirit of the Government, should be so held, d that whilst we would counsel no relaxation in a determined purpose to crush the re-bellion now existing in one portion of our once happy Union, at any cost and at any sacritice, it is no disloyalty to the Government— it is no violotion of our duty as American citizens—it is no sympathy with treason, to prefer, and express the preference for an honorable compromise of existing difficulties at any period of the controversy.

Resolved, That the country being in a state of war and the Government struggling for National existence, it is no time to dis-cuss the causes which produced the difficulties, or to countenance or encourage private, sectional or political animosities. We therefore proclaim ourselves loyal to the whole Union, as our fathers made it, with an unfaltering purpose to sustain and sup-port the Alministration in all proper efforts to avert rebellion and establish the supremacy of the laws. To this end we recommend to our fellow citizens of all parties, forbearance in a patriotic devot on and a single purpose to aid, by all the means in our power, a vigorous prosecution of the war to a successful termination.

Resolved. That we have entire confidence n the ability and patriotism of the gentlemen named by this Convention for the re-spective offices, and take pleasure in comending the Ticket formed to the unanimous and vigilant support of the Democracy of

Centre county.


