Another Commission. The system of remittances by

which the volunteer is afforded an opportunity of providing for his family while he is in service like all other operations in which money is involved, is attended with risk and imposition. The imposition and risk also fall on those least able to bear them, and in many cases the good intentions of the volunteer are frustrated by the sharks who infest Washington city for the purpose of robbing the soldier when they fail to rob the government. In order to protect the interests of the volunteer, and afford him every facility for remitting a portion or the whole of his pay to his family, or su ch other persons in whose support and comfort he is interested, Gov. Curtin has appointed a commission, whose duty it shall be to see that the soldier is guarded in this purpose as well as protected from any imposition by speculators and shavers. This commission consists of Mr. Edward C. Humes, of this place, Hen. Ed. Cowar, and T. E. Franklin, who are in Washington engaged in providing facilities for the accom modation of the soldier in this particular. These gentiemen are well known as perfectly reliable and competent for the disharge of this duty, and we are confident that they will give the business their earnest care and attention.
