

STATE NEWS.

The total amount of lumber that will be sent from the Clearfield region is estimated at 105,969,000 feet.

Dr. George B. Wood, the eminent physician and writer, died Sunday evening at his residence in Philadelphia. He was 82 years of age.

The South Williamsport Land Company, of Williamsport, tried the experiment last year of raising tobacco, and planted eight acres, which yielded from 1,500 to 1,600 pounds to the acre, all of which was well disposed of.

A landslide on the Lehigh Valley railroad at Pittston, Pa., on Monday, threw a locomotive of the New York passenger train from the track, killing the engineer, Nicholas Schilling, and seriously injuring the fireman.

On Wednesday afternoon in the city of Pittsburgh as an old man named John W. Hammel was standing on a high office-stool painting the front of a house on Penn avenue, John Wilkinson, a member of the fire department, came along with a couple of friends.

For the first time in the history of Philadelphia strawberries are to be seen in the market in March. They come from Florida, the first consignment having been received in the city on Wednesday. They were shipped by steamer from St. Johns river to Savannah, and there reshipped on a boat for that port, the voyage occupying four days.

The Ethel A. Merritt, which arrived in port on Friday, brought three thousand bunches of bananas and forty thousand bunches of coconuts. The schooners Lottie Byrnes, Hannah Coomer and Addie K. Warner, are also on their way with large consignments of the same fruits.

Mrs. John Horine, of Anderson county, Kentucky, a county which has heretofore been noted for its whiskey, a few days ago, gave birth to five children at one time. They are all living and doing well.

At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy railroad on Wednesday last all the retiring directors were re-elected except Robert Harns, whose place was filled by the election of Robert Bangs.

Judge J. M. ELLIOT, of the Kentucky Court of Appeals, was assassinated in the streets in front of the Capitol Hotel at 1 o'clock on Wednesday last, by Thomas Buford, of Henry county. Judge Elliott had rendered an opinion adverse to a case Buford had for some time in court. Buford loaded a double-barreled shot-gun and waited for Elliott to come to dinner, and walked up and shot him through the heart without warning, killing him instantly. The assassin was arrested and is now in jail. There is great excitement and strong feeling against him. Buford after his arrest acknowledged that the other barrel of the gun was loaded for Judge Fryor, and he would have killed him also had not some children been in the way. He is a brother of General Graham Buford, of Woodford county.

Philadelphia Markets. Tuesday, April 1. Flour.—There was no decided change in the general market, but a continuation of Saturday's dullness in all grades, with prices steady on the best trade brands of winter wheat and weak and unsettled on spring. The sales reported comprised about 1500 bbls, in lots, including superfine at \$2.75; winter extras at \$3.00; Pennsylvania families at \$1.75; for fair to choice. Rye Flour was quiet but steady at \$2.50; as to quality, with sales of 100 barrels at the outside rate. Corn Meal was inactive but unchanged at \$2.50 f. o. b. Sugar was dull and weak on the open market, with buyers and sellers in tight on State ref and amber, for which \$1.10 was asked, with \$1.15; the best reported bid.
