THE SOUTH AND THE PRESIDENCY-THE NE-GRO IN POLITICS.

Interview in New York Tribane.

There is another thing which ought not to be overlooked—that while the South is wholly Democratic and consti-tutes the strength of the Democratic party, we do not intend to ask a place party, we do not intend to ask a place upon the Presidential ticket for a South-ern man. We want the party in the North to place two good men on the ticket, and we will support it for the national success of the Democratic par-ty. With reference to the personal choice of the South for particular Presi-dential candidates, I do not think the South has made any. I believe that there has been a feeling that in justice to the old ticket it should be renomito the old ticket it should be renomiever, which may be urged against this, and the refusal of Mr. Hendricks to be put in nomination again seems to ren-der it impossible. I don't think the South cares a copper who the next Presidential candidate may be, as long as he is a strong National man. They

as he is a strong National man. They do not care where he comes from or what his financial views may be. There is a great deal of misapprehen-sion in the North as to the political condition of the negroes in the South. They seem to think that a colored man is bound to be a Republican because he is a colored man. But I know person-ally many colored men in South Caro-lina who have always been consistent Democrats and have suffered in conse-tion a trees. The latter, therefore, hold the balance of power. When I was elected Governor there were only 119,500 votes cast, and only 213 scattering votes thrown against me, and I was undoubt-edly elected by the colored voters, who at that time had all the machinery of elections in their hands. There was not a quarrel or a fist fight in that elec-tion. The Republicans could not put tion. The Republicans could not put a ticket in the field because the colored people were satisfied.
