Hickenlooper is not very widely known in Ohio or the West generally, and the news of his selection was rather a surprise and a trial to the editors of the country newspapers, who had to guess and gag at his name like chickens endeavoring to compass the deglutition of an oversized earth-worm. One paper in Min-nesota declares boldly that "Foster and Loppenhicker will sweep the State by 60,000;" another in Illinois cries, "We personally favored Taft and Foster, but the old Western Reserve will come out solid for Foster and Picklecho-ker;" a third—and this in Ohio—says in all the majesty of great black let-ters. "Foster and Howenking" ters, "Foster and Hoppenkicker-beat them who can;" a fourth, in Iowa, protests that "Foster and Poopenhickle will awake such enthusiasm as the Buckeye State has rarely resounded with;" the head lines of a fifth, in Wisconsin, are "Two glorious men-Foster and Pickenchooper - the nomies "a mass meeting to ratify the nomi-nation of Governor Foster and General Pooklehicken," and yet another in Pennsylvania, where it fairly rains jaw-breaking names, enthusiastically yells at the top of its type, "Tiger for Foster! 'Rah for Chicklepicken!" It is perhaps not a very important mat-ter, still it would avoid confusion if wholesale and retail. the Republican editors and orators would meet in convention and agree to shout for the second man on their ticket under one name, whether it be Heckenlooper, Loppenhicker, Picklechoker, Hoppenkicker, Poopenhickle, Pickenchooper, Pockyloopen, Choopenlicker, Pooplehicken or Chicklepicken.
