

Snuff in the Senate.

On each side of the Vice-President's seat in the United States Senate are fastened two old snuff boxes, which are kept filled by the attendants. They are the result of a custom inaugurated almost at the foundation of the Government, when snuff-taking was a universal habit. Thurman is the only Senator who makes a habit of using snuff, but sometimes a Senator will stop and take an occasional pinch, while the many visitors to the chamber take a little out of curiosity. At first the box was kept on the Vice-President's desk, but in those days so many of the Senators used the article, and so frequently forgot to bring their boxes with them, that it was resolved to place two public receptacles for it, and in the annual expenses of the Senate is always found the item of snuff. The aged doorkeeper, Isaac Bassitt, stated to your correspondent that he had often seen Henry Clay walk his place in the midst of a speech, leave gravely to the box, take a pinch and continue his remarks. "When I was a page, nearly fifty years ago," said he, "many of the Senators would give me a sign which indicated that they wanted snuff and I would carry the box to them. Nearly all the Senators used snuff in those days. Henry Clay was in the habit of giving me 50 cents a week to keep his box full of snuff, and I have never forgotten that when he left here for the last time, he owed me 50 cents for this service. I never brought a bill against the estate," said the old gentleman, smiling, "and I guess the debt is outlawed by this time."
